Overview of Our Agency

- * 8 Field Districts and Central Office in Oklahoma City
- * 2,376 Employees (Average for calendar year 2020)
 - Over 1,600 in field districts
 - Central Office is support for field districts
 - Down from 3,200 in 1990s
- Jurisdictional Responsibility for Interstates, US Numbered Routes and State Highways
 - Cities and towns maintain local streets within their municipal boundaries
 - County Commissioners maintain county roads
 - However the Department provides assistance to the counties and municipalities
 - Oklahoma Turnpike Authority maintains toll roads



Overview of the Transportation System in Oklahoma

- 17th largest transportation system (12,235 centerline miles)
 - California just over 15,000
 - Florida just under 12,000
- 28th most populous state (3.9 million)
 - Behind Oregon (4.3 million)
 - Ahead of Connecticut (3.6 million)
- Nearly 126 miles of state-owned operating rail lines
- McClellan-Kerr Arkansas River Navigation System
 - ODOT bulk salt storage



Impact to the ROADS Fund from 2018 Legislation

HB1010XX – Allocated 3 cent gasoline tax and 6 cent diesel tax to the ROADS Fund effective FY 2020. This measure further transferred equal amounts received into the ROADS Fund from income tax to General Revenue.

HB1014XX - Reallocated certain Motor Vehicle collections from General Revenue to the ROADS Fund.



NOTE: The ROADS fund cap remains at \$575 million

Impact to the ROADS Fund from 2020 Legislation

HB 2743 – Redirected \$180 Million from the ROADS Fund to the Education Reform Revolving Fund in FY's 2021 & 2022.

HB 2744 – Allowed ODOT to bond \$200 Million to offset the loss of revenue occurring from HB 2743, used for the roadway & bridge construction program.

Budgetary Considerations

- The Legislature authorizes ODOT's budgetary expenditures from historically available transportation funding sources.
- These sources are primarily comprised of federal and revolving funds including federal and state motor fuel taxes directed to the Highway Trust Fund (HTF) and the State Transportation Fund (STF) respectively, along with the Rebuilding Oklahoma Access and Driver Safety (ROADS) fund.
- In addition to the traditional "on-highway" activities, the department also administers a number of transportation funding programs for rail, transit and local governmental entities.
- Operational costs include maintenance and upkeep of the highway system.
- Capital activities include highway and bridge construction.
- Administrative costs account for only 2.75% of the overall budget.

8-Year Construction Work Plan FY 2021-2028

The 2021-2028 Construction Work Plan includes

- 609 bridges to be rehabilitated or replaced.
- Improvements to 1,879 miles of the highway system
- 804 miles of safety improvements to 2-lane highways.
- Total investment of \$6.2 billion.

Office of Mobility and Public Transit

- The Office of Mobility and Public Transit (OMPT) serves as the Governor's designee for oversight and administration of the Federal Transit Administration's 5303, 5310, 5311, 5329 and 5339 programs.
- 20 rural public transportation systems operate in 76 of the 77 counties.
- 145 Transit Agencies provide enhanced mobility services for seniors & individuals with disability in approximately 52 counties.
- Federal funds of \$23.7 million distributed annually and approximately \$23 million additional federal funds in competitive grant awards in 4 years with \$5.7 million State funds used as match.
- \$51.4 million was administered to rural transit agencies across the state received from FTA for CARES Act relief.
- Urban public transportation systems are operating in Oklahoma City, Tulsa, Edmond, Norman & Lawton.
- The elderly & economically challenged populations represent a majority of the approximate 10.5 million public transit trips each year.
- ODOT continues to administer the State Safety Oversight Program which was initiated to ensure FTA compliance for the Oklahoma City streetcar system.
- The Transportation Commission approved the first ever statewide Public Transit Policy Plan on December 10, 2020.





- 4 ports of entry with construction for a new facility in Bryan County projected to begin this year.
- 8 weigh stations in operation
- Enforcement is administered by OCC and DPS

Weigh Station Revolving Fund Uses & Resources:

- Facilities are built and maintained by ODOT
- ODOT purchases, installs and maintains all technology (license plate and USDOT readers, WIMs, TACS, DMS, Vi2M Software, CVIEW, scales etc.)
- Allocations include \$6 million from special assessment of fuel tax, \$10 million from DPS collections & \$750,000 from OCC

Focused Performance Metrics

Continued reductions in:

- Highway fatalities
- Structurally deficient bridges
- Two-lane highways with insufficient shoulders

***** Continued improvements to:

- Pavement condition
- Bundling of close-proximity and similar projects into one contract to achieve costs savings
- Digital information management
