Advisory Board

(K.S.A.)

- Review the state weed management plan and recommend changes and updates
- Recommend changes to the weed list;
- Recommend changes to the noxious weed act and regulations;
- Recommend changes to the official methods for control; and
- Report to the secretary on:
 - (A) The expenditure of funds on weed control;
 - (B) the status of the weed control programs;
 - (C) recommendations best use of funds for weed control;
 - (D) recommendations on long-term weed control needs.



- Department of Agriculture (K.S.A. 2-1315 to 2-1317)
 - Determine which weeds are on the noxious weed list
 - Approve employment of weed supervisor
 - Adopt and publish species control programs
 - Herbicides listed for cost-share
 - Enter agreements with federal agencies
 - Provide annual report, general notice and management report forms



- County Commissioners (K.S.A. 2-1316 & 2-1322)
 - Hire Weed Directors
 - Determine cost share policy
 - Purchase and maintain equipment and chemicals
 - Determine county option weeds
 - Maintain records



Weed Directors

(K.S.A. 2-1316, 2-1318 & 2-1331)

- Cooperate with KDA
- Annual report and management plan by Mar. 15
- Conduct a survey of noxious weeds by Oct. 31
- Check DriftWatch before spraying.
- Consult, advise and render assistance to landowners
- Investigate or aid in the investigation and prosecution of violations



Funding of Weed Law

- K.S.A. 2-1318
 - Separate levy
 - May set aside money from general fund for noxious weed control
 - Noxious Weed Fund Only for noxious or county weed control
 - Based on inventory of weeds in county



Cost-Share Herbicides

(K.S.A. 2-1318 & 2-1322)

- Only for noxious weeds
- Only for taxpayers
- If the mil levy or its equivalent for noxious weeds is less than 1.5 mills - must sell at 50 to 75% of the county's cost (including storage & handling)
- If the mil levy or its equivalent is equal or greater than 1.5 mills - sell at 75 to 100% of the county's cost (including storage & handling)
- County may adopt a cost share certificate system



Unlawful Acts

(K.S.A. 2-1325 to 2-1329)

- Sell, offer for sale or give away infested screenings
- Sell, barter or give away infested nursery stock etc.
- Custom harvest machines must be clean and labeled
- Sell, offer for sale, etc., infested livestock feed unless processed to destroy the viability of weed seeds
- Feed infested livestock feed except on the farm where grown

Noxious Weed Regulations

- Noxious Weed List
 - Recently moved from statute
 - 12 species
 - 3 tiers


County option Bur ragweed

Kansas Noxious Weeds

A county weed director may require control and eradication measures more stringent than those set forth in the tier descriptions if the weed director determines it is necessary to do so






Kansas Noxious Weeds
