## First Regular Session of the Fifty-ninth Legislature of the State of Oklahoma

**Twenty-first Legislative Day, Thursday, March 9, 2023**

Pursuant to the Paxton motion, the Senate adjourned at 2:40 p.m. to meet Monday, March 13, 2023, at 1:30 p.m.
