Division and Program Descriptions

Oklahoma Complete College America Initiative

The highest higher education priority is the Complete College America Initiative. Complete College America is the most comprehensive and ambitious higher education initiative ever undertaken by the State of Oklahoma. The goal is to increase the number of degrees and certifications earned in Oklahoma by 1,700 per year for 12 years, resulting in a 67% increase by 2023. CCA is part of a unified economic policy that involves the Governor, post-secondary education, and business and industry. Working through the CCA leadership team and key cabinet officials, the call has come from the Governor for these priorities to be central to job creation and workforce development now and in the future. The CCA and National Governors' Association's Complete to Compete action plan is an acceleration of efforts to make significant improvements to two critical segments of the educational pipeline in Oklahoma: (1) restructuring remedial and developmental education, and (2) developing accelerated degree completion options. Undergirding all of these efforts is Oklahoma's revised Performance Funding Formula that utilizes appropriate components of the State and campus level CCA and NGA metrics that reflect these new priorities by measuring improvement in outcome measures.

This program supports the Oklahoma Works Education and Economy Goals. The Objective Measures are increasing the number of degrees and certificates, increasing the state median household income and decreasing the state poverty rate. The statewide programs for these Oklahoma Works Goals are Higher Education and Wealth Generation.

This program is tracked through the Performance Budgeting Model under the Goal of Educated Citizens and Exemplary Schools. The budgeting program code is Higher Education (C0103).

State Regents Administration

The State Regents prescribe academic standards of higher education, determine functions and courses of study at state colleges and universities, grant degrees, recommend to the state Legislature budget allocations for each college and university, and recommend proposed fees within limits set by the Legislature. In addition to oversight of the system, this Agency is also responsible for the management and administration of state financial aid, scholarship programs and Onenet. This program supports the Oklahoma Works Education Goal. The Objective Measure is increasing the number of degrees and certificates. The statewide program for the Oklahoma Works Goal is Higher Education.

This program is tracked through the Performance Budgeting Model under the Goal of Educated Citizens and Exemplary Schools. The budgeting program code is Higher Education (C0103).

Universities, Colleges and Constituent Agencies

Beginning in FY'13, Institutions of Higher Education are receiving all new funds, over and above their base, from a new Performance
Funding Formula. The new Performance Funding Formula measures each institution on a set of performance measures. The improvement
in performance measures are then calculated to determine the percentage of new funds an institution will receive. Performance measures
used in the new Performance Funding Formula are: 1) Campus Degree Completion Plan, 2) First Year Retention Rates. 3) Pell Grant Retention,
4) 24 Hour Course Passage, 5) Graduation Rates, 6) Complete College America Degree Target Goals, 7) Number of Certificates/Degrees
Conferred and 8) Maintenance of Program Certification.

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This program supports the Oklahoma Works Education Goal. The Objective Measures are increasing the number of degrees and certificates and increasing the graduation rates at all higher education institutions. The statewide program for the Oklahoma Works Goal is Higher Education.

This program is tracked through the Performance Budgeting Model under the Goal of Educated Citizens and Exemplary Schools. The budgeting program code is Higher Education (C0103).

Endowed Chairs

Created in 1988, the purpose of the endowed chairs program is to support the establishment of faculty chairs and professorships to improve the quality of instruction and research at colleges and universities in the state system. In 2012, the Governor and Legislature authorized the transfer of \$149.5 million to Higher Education that provided state match to establish chairs, professorships and lectureships at higher educ. Institutions. Over 1,008 slots have been funded and there are approximately 826 accounts waiting to receive state matching funds (\$162.3 million)

This program supports the Oklahoma Works Education Goal. The Objective Measures are increasing the number of degrees and certificates and increasing the graduation rates at all higher education institutions. The statewide program for the Oklahoma Works Goal is Higher Education.

This program is tracked through the Performance Budgeting Model under the Goal of Educated Citizens and Exemplary Schools. The budgeting program code is Higher Education (C0103).

Academic Scholars

The purpose of this program is to encourage the state's and nation's best students to attend higher education institutions in Oklahoma. Students qualify for the program by receiving an official national designation or must be nominated by a higher education institution. The program provides \$5,500/year to students attending OU, OSU or the University of Tulsa; \$4,000/year to students attending an Oklahoma four-year institution or \$3,500 for students attending a two-year institution. In order to remain eligible for this award, students must maintain a 3.25 GPA and attend 24 hours of courses a year.

This program supports the Oklahoma Works Education Goal. The Objective Measures are increasing the number of degrees and certificates and increasing the graduation rates at all higher education institutions. The statewide program for the Oklahoma Works Goal is Higher Education.

This program is tracked through the Performance Budgeting Model under the Goal of Educated Citizens and Exemplary Schools.

The budgeting program code is Higher Education (C0103).

Oklahoma's Promise - Oklahoma Higher Learning Access Program (OHLAP)

The program is designed to provide an incentive for more students to aspire for college, prepare themselves academically in high school, and ultimately earn college degrees. Students from families with incomes of \$55,000 or less must enroll in the program in the 8th, 9th, or 10th grade. To earn the scholarship, students must complete a college preparatory curriculum, achieve at least a 2.50 GPA in the core curriculum and overall, attend school regularly, and refrain from drug abuse or delinquent acts. The award pays tuition at public colleges or an equivalent amount at private colleges.

This program supports the Oklahoma Works Education Goal. The Objective Measures are increasing the percentage of eligible students that enroll in the Oklahoma's Promise scholarship program, increasing the number of degrees and certificates and increasing the graduation rates at all higher education institutions. The statewide programs for these Oklahoma Works Goals are Need- Based Aid and Higher Education.

This program is tracked through the Performance Budgeting Model under the Goal of Educated Citizens and Exemplary Schools. The budgeting program code is Need-Based Aid (C0001).

Adult Degree Completion Program

Reach Higher, Oklahoma's Adult Degree Completion Program, is designed for Oklahomans with some college, but no degree to return and complete a degree in a flexible, accelerated, and affordable way. Associate and Bachelor degrees are offered online and in 8-week formats for working adults. The first course was offered in March 2007 with 36 majors. As of 2017, 4,664 individuals have graduated from the 22 public colleges and universities participating in the program across the state.

This program supports the Oklahoma Works Education and Economy Goals. The Objective Measures are increasing the number of degrees and certificates, increasing the state median household income and decreasing the state poverty rate. The statewide programs for these Oklahoma Works Goals are Higher Education and Wealth Generation.

This program is tracked through the Performance Budgeting Model under the Goal of Educated Citizens and Exemplary Schools. The budgeting program code is Higher Education (C0103).

Cooperative Alliances

Under this program students at 29 of the State's Career Tech schools can be eligible to gain college credits immediately for technical education classes. These alliances between the State Regents and the State Career Tech System provide a cost effective way for students to gain improved quality courses and be encouraged to pursue college. The alliances also have potential to reduce remediation needs of incoming students.

This program supports the Oklahoma Works Education Goal. The Objective Measure is increasing the number of degrees and certificates. The statewide program for the Oklahoma Works Goal is Higher Education.

This program is tracked through the Performance Budgeting Model under the Goal of Educated Citizens and Exemplary Schools. The budgeting program code is Higher Education (C0103).

Concurrent Enrollment

Allows junior and senior high school students to enroll in college-level courses while still in high school. The senior students are eligible for tuition waivers for coursework up to six credit-hours per semester when taken the summer following their junior year in high school through the spring term of their senior year.

This program supports the Oklahoma Works Education Goal. The Objective Measure is increasing the number of Concurrent Enrollment hours that have been completed by incoming college freshman. The statewide program for the Oklahoma Works Goal is College Preparedness.

This program is tracked through the Performance Budgeting Model under the Goal of Educated Citizens and Exemplary Schools. The budgeting program code is Higher Education (C0103).

GEAR UP

The State Regents have been awarded three successive GEAR UP grants. The current grant provides Oklahoma \$34.9 mill in federal funds over 7 years. The goal of GEAR UP is to significantly increase the number of students from low-income communities who are prepared to enter and succeed in postsecondary education. GEAR UP uses multiple proven strategies including professional development activities for educators to increase academic rigor and create a college-going culture in schools; leadership training to help parents become active partners in their local schools; and dissemination of a broad array of college access and financial aid information throughout the community.

This is a federal program that supports the Oklahoma Works Education Goal. The Objective Measure is increasing the percentage of high school graduates meeting college readiness benchmarks. The statewide program for the Oklahoma Works Goal is College Preparedness.

This program is tracked through the Performance Budgeting Model under the Goal of Educated Citizens and Exemplary Schools. The budgeting program code is College Preparedness (C0101).
