1.) Are there any services no longer provided because of budget cuts?

The last several years of declining appropriations has resulted in the continued inability to fund new requests for CTE programs in K-12 classrooms. There are currently 1: CTE programs in the state. Agency FTE has been reduced approximately 35% over the last 9 years. This staff reduction; decreased travel budget; decreased professions opportunities; and reduced classroom support continues to impact services provided to our customers and stakeholders.

2.) What services are provided at a higher cost to the user?

Professional development to schools, external contract services, and assessment fees.

3.) What services are still provided but with a slower response rate?

Agency staff reductions over the last several years continue to delay our response time to meet the needs of our customers and stakeholders.

CareerTech would continue to be unable to fund new requests for CTE programs in K-12 classrooms. Efforts to reduce recidivism through the Skills Centers inmate training would continue to be affected. CareerTech would be unable to expand CareerTech offerings; increase industry credentials; expand business and industry services and su resources for student engagement with business and industry. CareerTech's ability to increase educational attainment and career awareness for Oklahomans which leads equipped workforce would be affected.

#### How would the agency handle a 2% appropriation reduction in FY '20?

A 2% appropriations reduction for FY20 would result in a reduction of funding for CTE programs in the state. Services and funding available for workforce and economic d initiatives would be reduced. Inmate training programs in Skills Centers would be reduced. Services provided to schools, such as professional development, program eva program support, would be reduced.

#### Federal Government Impact

All federal money received by the Agency either as a prime recipient or a sub-recipient has federal deliverables and outcomes attached to it.

2.) Are any of those funds inadequate to pay for the federal mandate?

Yes, state appropriated funds are required as a grant match or for cost sharing of the federal project.

3.) What would the consequences be of ending all of the federal funded programs for your agency?

There would be substantial negative consequences from the loss of federal funding including the termination of staff and closing of programs, resulting in the state's loss of prepared workforce. Bid Assistance Centers would be closed; TANF client assistance would be terminated; high school equivalency test preparation services would ceas technical programs would suffer in their ability to remain academically rigorous and up-to-date for the needs of business and industry.

4.) How will your agency be affected by federal budget cuts in the coming fiscal year?

Should federal budget cuts occur, depending on the depth of the cuts, the agency could lose the ability to provide flow through dollars for Carl Perkins, TANF, and high schequivalency test preparation funding to over 400 comprehensive high schools, 29 technology centers, and 19 community colleges. In addition, agency staffing, profession for teachers, and CareerTech program curriculum could be significantly affected.

5.) Has the agency requested any additional federal earmarks or increases? Not at this time.

### **Division and Program Descriptions**

Education and Workforce Development (Administrative Services):

This activity provides administrative services in support of all CareerTech goals.

Education and Workforce Development (Educational Attainment):

This strategic priority utilizes agency leadership, operations, dissemination of best practices, and delivery arms to increase the educational attainment for Oklahomans. Through this coursework, individuals will acquire knowledge and technical skills to succeed in education and gain a competitive edge in society. Additionally, one of the key components to decreasing Oklahoma's education attainment of industry recognized certifications and credentials, which is a primary focus of this program.

Education and Workforce Development (Customized Training and Consulting):

CareerTech fulfills a unique and critical need for Oklahoma businesses to successfully compete in a global economy. CareerTech provides essential needs to meet the workers to increase productivity; reduce costs; reduce human injury rates; and upgrade incumbent workers skills, which in turn fosters innovation and business growth and development.

Education and Workforce Development (Curriculum, Assessment, & Digital Delivery):

This activity provides curriculum and assessment tools to schools in alignment with industry needs, which plays a vital role in providing quality educational experiences to validates student achievements.

Education and Workforce Development (Skills Centers):

This strategic priority delivers career and technology education to inmates under the supervision of the Oklahoma Department of Corrections as well as juveniles under the the Oklahoma Office of Juvenile Affairs. In a joint effort, CareerTech assists with dropout recovery, which adds members to the prepared workforce; and when they are fur reduces crime and reduces the financial burdens to taxpayers.

Education and Workforce Development (Student & Stakeholder Support):

This activity provides accreditation services for technology center programs; administers programs utilizing federal and state funds in matters relating to vocational and teceducation; provides for formulation and adoption of curricula; develops a plan to provide adequate vocational offerings accessibility so all students have the ability to beneft participates in the recruitment and training of companies to locate or expand operations in the state.

ISD Data Processing (Data Processing):

This activity accounts for information technology and telecommunications services in support of all CareerTech goals.
