No, the services provided are a choice made by the agency.

3.) What would the consequences be of ending all of the federal funded programs for your agency?

The results would be catastrophic. Animal Health, Food Safety, Wildlife Services, Forestry, Consumer Protection Services, Wildfire suppression, Ag Statistics and Market Development all depend on federal funding to provide services.

4.) How will your agency be affected by federal budget cuts in the coming fiscal year?

Federal budget cuts would lead to reduced services. To date, Food Safety, Animal Health and Fire Protection have received high priority at the federal level.

5.) Has the agency requested any additional federal earmarks or increases?

The agency is always seeking ways to increase Federal reimbursements however, those options are limited.
