AGENCY MISSION STATEMENT:

- The mission of the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner is to protect the public health and safety of Oklahomans through the scientific investigation of deaths as defined by state statutes. This process involves scene investigation and medicolegal autopsy (including radiology, toxicology, histology, and microbiology) complementing the activities of law enforcement agencies, district attorneys and public health officials and we accept the responsibility with integrity, diligence and compassion in order to best assist and provide answers to families, law enforcement and taxpayers of this state.

GOVERNANCE:

- The Board of Medicolegal Investigations is the governing is policy-making body for the Chief Medical Examiner. With the exception of one member, all members of the Board are ex officio members or that member's designee. - Created an electronic submission of cremation and out of state permits. Eliminating one FTE.

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- Adjusted the decedent pick up and drop off times, eliminating three FTE.
- Combined four managerial level jobs into one position.
- Pay our utilities with our P-Card in order to receive a rebate from the P-Card issuer.
- Replaced lighting in both morgues with T8 lighting. We received a rebate through OG&E as well as the bulbs are brighter and use less energy.
- We changed most of fleet vehicles to CNG and/or new vehicles. Fuel billings have decreased over \$1000.00 a month. Investigators have not been stranded since the vehicle change.
- We have installed intelligent thermostats that regulate the usage of heat/air during non-working hours.
- We have asked staff to turn off all unnecessary lights and apparatus during off hours.
- We have digitized our records which are more cost effective with storage/space, toner, paper, personnel time and overall security.
