Division and Program Descriptions

Administration

The Administration Division's 23 employees perform a great variety of tasks to support the agency's 336 employees carrying out the Department mission. Administration Division consists of Accounting, Licensing, Information Technology, Human Resources, Communications and Property.

Wildlife

Manage the state's wildlife resources and their habitats, and provide hunting and other outdoor recreational opportunities, through public lands acquisition and management, cooperative and technical assistance, research and surveys and education.

Fisheries

The Department's Fisheries Division manages this important recreational resource, and meets this challenge by focusing on management, research and production.

Law Enforcement

Law Enforcement Division enforces laws and regulations that protect Oklahoma's wildlife resources. The Division consists of 118 employees, with a field force of 90 game wardens, 16 game warden supervisors and eight district chiefs. Central office staff includes the chief and assistant chief of enforcement, training coordinator and one secretary. At least one game warden is assigned to each of the 77 counties. Some counties have two or three wardens.

Information & Education

The Information and Education Division informs and educates Oklahoma citizens about Department programs, policies and regulations. Personnel in the division encourage public support of the Wildlife Department, instill in Oklahomans a sense of conservation awareness, and help them enjoy outdoor recreation opportunities. The I&E Division is organized into two sections -- Information and Education.
