The Constitution of the State of Oklahoma, Article X, Section 23, as last amended April 30, 1985, provides in pertinent part:

Not more than forty-five (45) days or less than thirty-five (35) days prior to the convening of each regular session of the Legislature, the State Board of Equalization shall certify the total amount of revenue which accrued during the last preceding fiscal year to the General Revenue Fund and to each Special Revenue Fund appropriated directly by the Legislature, and further certify amounts available for appropriation which shall be based on a determination, in accordance with the procedure hereinafter provided, of the revenues to be received by the state under the laws in effect at the time such determination is made, for the next ensuing fiscal year, showing separately the revenues to accrue to the credit of each such fund appropriated directly by the Legislature.

Amounts certified as available for appropriation from each fund, as hereinbefore provided shall be ninety-five percent (95%) of an itemized estimate made by the State Board of Equalization, which shall include all sources of revenue to each fund for the next ensuing fiscal year, provided, however, appropriated federal funds shall be certified for the full amount of the estimate. Said estimate shall consider any increase or decline in revenues that would result from predictable changes in the economy.

The following report has been prepared in accordance with the procedures set forth above, and is respectfully submitted for your consideration.

EDUCATION REFORM ACT -- HB 1017
Schedule 1-A

Section 41.29a of Title 62 subsection A states: "In order that the Legislature may guarantee that the increased revenue generated as a result of the tax changes contained in this act shall be appropriated to fund the education reforms provided for in this act, the Office of State Finance shall present as part of the official certification process for each fiscal year an estimate of all revenues which shall accrue to the General Revenue Fund as a result of the tax changes contained in this act. The estimate shall show the increased revenue from personal income taxes, corporate income taxes and sales and use taxes as a result of the provisions of this act separately. The estimate shall further account for changes to such revenue which result from growth or decline in said tax sources due to economic circumstances."

The method of determining the percentage of each source attributable to HB 1017 was set by the State Board of Equalization at its April 26, 1990 meeting. The ratios were established originally by dividing the estimate of revenue to be raised as a result of HB 1017 by the total estimate of revenue of each source at the time of passage of HB 1017. These ratios were updated at the February 19, 1991 meeting to reflect the annualization of what were partial year estimates at the April 26, 1990 meeting of the State Board of Equalization.

APPROPRIATION LIMITATION

Schedule 2

Section 23, paragraph 1 of Article X, Constitution of Oklahoma, provides for a limitation on appropriations, except for appropriations from the Constitutional Reserve Fund. Pursuant to said limitation, appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1995, shall not exceed the amount appropriated for the current fiscal year, 1994, plus 12 percent (12%) adjusted for inflation as measured at the close of the calendar year. The amounts appropriated from each fund by the First Regular Session, 44th Legislature, 1993, and approved by the Governor, are listed below. The total, \$3,520,265,424, was derived as a summation of the individual funds. The limit on appropriations will be presented to the State Board of Equalization in February as provided by the Constitution. The Gross National Implicit Price Deflator for State and Local Governments is proposed as the index for the measure of inflation.

A joint resolution directing the Secretary of State to refer to the people for their approval or rejection proposed amendments to Sections 8, 8A, 9, 10, 22, 26 and 28 of Article X of the Constitution of the State of Oklahoma, a proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Oklahoma by adding new Sections to Article X to be designated as Sections 44, 45, 46, 47, 48, 49 and 50 and a proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Oklahoma by repealing Sections 12a and 32 of Article X, which relate to revenue and taxation; modifying method of valuing and assessing property which may be taxed ad valorem; requiring that such property be taxed at permanent assessment ratio and specifying method of determination thereof; modifying certain millage levels; fixing classifications of types of property for purposes of ad valorem taxation; providing that school district not be allowed to become indebted except as specifically provided; defining terms; requiring Legislature to develop funding system for K-12 schools and specifying revenue sources thereof; specifying certain millage level; requiring Legislature to provide for funding of K-12 scholarships; requiring Legislature to provide certain reimbursement mechanism; requiring Legislature to provide risk management services for schools and to place limits on tort liability of schools; requiring payment for tort liabilities from certain accounts; requiring Legislature to develop method for school to raise funds for certain purposes; providing ballot title; and directing filing.

SJR 36 — By Wright.

A joint resolution directing the Secretary of State to refer to the people for their approval or rejection a proposed amendment to Section 10 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Oklahoma; setting term of service of Presiding Judge; prohibiting service of certain successive terms; providing ballot title; and directing filing.

SJR 37 — By Williams (Penny).

A joint resolution directing the Secretary of State to refer to the people for their approval or rejection a proposed amendment to Section 10A of Article X of the Constitution of the State of Oklahoma, which relates to tax levies for county libraries; increasing millage caps relating to ad valorem tax levies for counties; authorizing use of ad valorem tax revenues for libraries and library services authorized by the Legislature; providing ballot title; and directing filing.

SJR 38 — By Monson.

A joint resolution which relates to the call for a United States Constitutional Convention; withdrawing the Oklahoma State Legislature's call for a United States Constitutional Convention; amending Section 3 of Enrolled House Joint Resolution No. 1049 of the 2nd Session of the 35th Oklahoma Legislature, which relates to a request that the Congress of the United States issue a call for a constitutional convention; clarifying certain language; deleting proposal that other state legislatures call for a constitutional convention; repealing Section 2 of Enrolled House Joint Resolution No. 1049 of the 2nd Session of the 35th Oklahoma Legislature, which relates to a request that the Congress of the United States issue a call for a constitutional convention; and directing distribution.

SJR 39 — By Haney.

A joint resolution relating to public health and safety; requiring the State Department of Health to cooperate with certain state agencies to establish certain procedures; providing for an annual survey of certain youth in Oklahoma schools for certain purpose; requiring use of certain survey; authorizing the Department to subcontract with certain entity for certain purpose; requiring survey to be conducted in selected local school districts throughout the state by certain state agencies; providing for codification; and providing an effective date.

SJR 40 — By Easley.

A joint resolution directing the Secretary of State to refer to the people for their approval or rejection a proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Oklahoma by adding a new section to Article VII to be designated as Section 3.1 and proposed amendments to Section 8 of Article VII and Section 2 of Article VII-B of the Constitution of the State of Oklahoma and proposed amendments to the Oklahoma Statutes; amending 20 O.S. 1991, Section 30.15 and 85 O.S. 1991, Section 1.2, as last amended by Section 1, Chapter 349, O.S.L. 1993 (85 O.S. Supp. 1993, Section 1.2), which relate to terms of judges; limiting years of service of members of the judiciary; conforming language; providing ballot title; and directing filing.

SJR 41 — By Monson.

A joint resolution directing the Secretary of State to refer to the people for their approval or rejection proposed statutes and amendments to the Oklahoma Statutes relating to universal health care coverage; amending 36 O.S. 1991, Section 624 and 37 O.S. 1991, Section 553, as amended by Section 3, Chapter 146, O.S.L. 1993 (37 O.S. Supp. 1993, Section 553), which relate to insurance premiums and excise tax rates; increasing certain taxes and providing procedures related thereto; stating purpose of revenues resulting from the increase; providing for collection of levies; creating the Universal Health Care Coverage Revolving Fund; providing for codification; providing ballot title; and directing filing.

SCR 28 — By Easley of the Senate and Adair of the House.

A concurrent resolution memorializing the U.S. Congress to lift any present and refrain from adopting any future unfunded federal mandates on state and local governments; and directing distribution.

SCR 29 — By Leftwich and Hendrick of the Senate and Gray and Fallin of the House.

A concurrent resolution redesignating the Beaver River and North Canadian River as the "Oklahoma River" for certain purposes; providing for river to be redesignated on certain maps; limiting certain uses of redesignated name; and directing distribution.

A concurrent resolution memorializing the U.S. Congress to endorse and support the efforts to inform citizens about the impact of unfunded federal mandates on state and local governments; and directing distribution.

A concurrent resolution expressing legislative support for a policy of state governmental support for the establishment of child day care centers for state employees; encouraging the Administrator of the Office of Personnel Management to work toward realizing the goal of establishing on-site day care; and directing distribution.

SCR 32 — By Long (Ed).

A concurrent resolution relating to the reauthorization of the federal Safe Drinking Water Act; stating support for reauthorization of said act with certain provisions; and directing distribution.

SCR 33 — By Wright of the Senate and Hefner of the House.

A concurrent resolution memorializing the President and the Congress of the United States to maintain National Guard strength at the highest possible level; and directing distribution.

SCR 34 — By Muegge.

A concurrent resolution relating to pollution prevention recognition program; requiring the Department of Environmental Qual-

ity to create a program to award certain entities for significant pollution prevention efforts; and directing distribution.

SCR 35 — By Helton.

A concurrent resolution stating legislative intent that the State Crime Stoppers be the official state program; encouraging local governments, the private sector and the public to participate, support and make donations to the program to be used to make rewards for the criminal prosecution of law violators and provide technical assistance and training for local crimestoppers programs; and directing distribution.

SR 21 — By Hendrick.

A resolution praising the life and career of Senator John R. McCune; extending sincere and heartfelt condolences to his family, coworkers and friends; making a permanent record; and directing distribution.

SR 22 — By Herbert.

A resolution directing the Department of Environmental Quality to conduct a study of the uses of pesticides and herbicides and rules governing the application of toxic chemicals; and directing distribution.

SR 23 — By Muegge.

A resolution encouraging state agencies to promote pollution prevention goals; and directing distribution.

MESSAGE FROM THE HOUSE

Advising the Honorable Senate that the House of Representatives is ready to convene in Joint Session.

Senator Roberts moved that the Senate meet with the House in Joint Session, and that when the clerk's desk is clear, the Senate stand adjourned to convene Tuesday, February 8, 1994, at 1:30 p.m., which motion prevailed.

Pursuant to the Roberts motion, the Senate adjourned at 12:25 p.m., to meet Tuesday, February 8, 1994, at 1:30 p.m.

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JOINT SESSION

The First Joint Session of the 2nd Regular Session of the 44th Legislature was called to order by the President of the Senate, Lieutenant Governor Jack Mildren.

Senator Roberts moved that the attendance roll call of the Senate be considered the attendance roll call of the Senate in Joint Session, which motion was declared adopted.

Representative Benson moved that the attendance roll call of the House of Representatives be considered the attendance roll call of the House in Joint Session, which motion was declared adopted.

President Mildren declared quorums of the Senate and House present and Joint Session duly assembled.

The invocation was offered by Reverend Terry Wilson.

Senator Roberts moved that the President and Speaker appoint a committee of three members from the Senate and House of Representatives, respectively, as a Joint Committee to notify Governor David Walters that the Second Session of the 44th Legislature is now in Joint Session and ready to receive him and hear his message, which motion was declared adopted.

President Mildren appointed for the Senate the following: Senators Stipe, Monson and Henry.

Speaker Johnson appointed for the House of Representatives the following: Representatives Apple, Wells and Satterfield.

President Mildren recognized Sergeant at Arms, Bob Craig, who announced the arrival of the Honorable David Walters, Governor of the State of Oklahoma.

Governor Walters was escorted to the Speaker's rostrum by the Joint Committee and presented to the Joint Session by President Mildren where he delivered his message.

MESSAGE OF GOVERNOR DAVID WALTERS

I thank the leaders of the Legislature, the members of the Senate and the House, and the members of the Judiciary for being here today to hear my message. I welcome the members of the public who are listening or watching today.

I extend a special thank-you to Senate President Pro Tem Bob Cullison and Speaker Glen Johnson for their hard work and leadership. Together, we have passed and signed a lot of legislation that has made a difference. I am honored to have Vice Chief Justice Robert Lavender and the Justices of the Supreme Court here today as well.

Let me begin by introducing the members of my Cabinet, staff and family who are in this chamber today.

To my staff, the most resilient, tenacious and focused group of men and women with whom I have ever had the honor to be associated, my appreciation for all that you have helped me do.

To the most professional and innovative Cabinet ever assembled in Oklahoma history, I am grateful to you for your service to Oklahoma, and I am very proud of your success.

Two of my four brothers are here today, Wayne from Canute who farms, teaches, and is a leader of the OSU alumni, and Tom, a decorated Vietnam War veteran.

My daughters Tanna, Kristen and Elizabeth.

And a woman who has done so much in her own right and has made a difference in the health of children in our state, who has been asked to bear more than she should in the name of public service, the First Lady of Oklahoma, my wife Rhonda.

As I look out at this audience of friends and a few foes, I am humbled to realize that so few have had the opportunity to speak to you in this way and from this position. State of the State speeches are always special, and each of mine has been different, but today's speech is very special for me. Having had the privilege of standing before you three other times to share my vision and plans, this State of the State speech is different in that it is my last. While that makes it all the more important to me, I hope it has some meaning to you in that my words may be of more value because I can speak with the freedom of someone released from the considerations of political caution.

I will leave here with a great sense of the responsibility that we have in this life and in this democracy to care for those whose lot in life leaves them helpless — children, the poor, the sick, the elderly, the victims. I will leave awed by the power that you possess to make laws and change peoples' lives, millions of lives. But I will also leave realizing the frustrations of bureaucracy and special interests and the ability of those who care more about themselves than our state's future to stop needed changes. I also, of course, will leave with the personal pain of loss and damage that this whole experience has brought to me and my family.

I know it sounds a little unusual, but I hope you can understand when I say that I am both honored and humbled to have had this chance to serve, and at the same time regretful that I ever asked my family to let me pursue my dream of serving as Governor of Oklahoma. The risk can be so high, the price so great, that I hope and pray that somehow our democracy survives the mounting pressures of the modern-day treatment of our candidates and our public officials. We need good people and we need people of courage and we need people who will risk failure in order to succeed.

Oklahomans would be so pleased if I could somehow show them how many people there are in this chamber and in government who are good and courageous and who only want to do great things for our state. When I leave this office I will regret whatever has happened in these years to add to the public cynicism about what goes on in this government of theirs. While performance alone is not enough, I hope we can reflect on the good things that have happened and draw on them as sources of hope for the next year.

Who would have imagined that so much could be done together?

It's still hard for me to believe that we will successfully complete the five-year plan set out by you in House Bill 1017. You took a risk in passing the plan in 1990, and it must be with great pride that you see this foundation, this beginning of such important improvements in elementary and secondary education, put in place with such steadfast commitment.

Most of you understand how difficult it has been to increase the funding by over 30 percent during this four-year period without a tax increase, particularly since economic growth was less than projected when you determined in 1990 what the price tag for each of the next four years was going to be.

Well, the bills arrived, almost \$100 million a year, and we went to work, cut budgets, reallocated funds and fully funded this plan. We believed and we were committed and we were successful. On behalf of the State of Oklahoma, I thank you and those who stood with you but are no longer here — such as Steve Lewis and Henry Bellmon — for taking the risk that allowed us to succeed.

Not all of our education problems are solved. But when I leave this Capitol and go to Hugo, and walk through their modern new elementary school, and watch those kids in Principal Jethelyn Gregory's sunrise program, or when I danced — not very well, I might add — with little Geeaneka Maxey in Tahlequah at Greenwood Elementary School's general assembly and then answer their questions, or when I visit any of the other 30 schools across the state that I have toured — but particularly when I stood in this chamber 13 days ago and for two hours discussed our state's future with young high school leaders whom we had invited from across Oklahoma, I realize that a great good has happened, the kind that few states can match. Few legislatures and governors can claim the progress that has been our privilege to be a part of.

I thank the parents and citizens who helped defeat State Question 639 in 1991. I thank the teachers who marched at the Capitol. I thank Sandy Garrett for her steady leadership; Kyle Dahlem, Barbara Smith and all of the leaders of the Oklahoma Education Association; George Singer and Task Force 2000; Terry Almon; and all the teachers, administrators, cooks, maintenance staff, bus drivers and students who have made this success. We are ahead, not behind. We are moving up the list, not down, and we should be very grateful and we should be very proud.

I will recommend that you finish the five-year funding plan for elementary and sec-

ondary education with a \$66-million dollar appropriation and that we keep our commitment to reform and improvement of our childrens' schools as strong as that day in April 1990 when you passed House Bill 1017. This funding will bring the total increase during the four years of our time together to \$377 million — \$54 million from the original 1017 tax increases passed in 1990, \$41 million from the local direct funds, and \$282 million from general revenue funds. This has been a piece of work and a good one. Congratulations.

After years of debating whether education improvement or job development should come first, I am pleased that our state launched aggressive efforts simultaneously.

At first this jobs business looked a little grim. As you recall, I asked for a special session the first day I took office, and we passed the incentives for United Airlines and McDonnell-Douglas. After thousands of hours of work, including my waltzing into the United chairman's office in Chicago uninvited to make our case when they initially refused to see us, both prospects melted away.

The job and economic numbers in 1991 were not great. Oklahoma had at least nine bank failures a year, retail sales were stagnant, bankruptcies were near the 4,000 mark and construction was flat.

It began slowly and then with more force. Weaknesses were identified, programs and bills were developed, and with your help and leadership we started licking this problem. Tyson Foods said that corporate farming laws kept them from investing in Oklahoma, and so you passed Senate Bill 518.

I didn't know when I signed that bill — and I don't think that Senators Ed Long and Don Williams and Representatives Jim

Glover and Fred Stanley knew when they authored the bill — what was to come: an avalanche of food processing plants that thrust Oklahoma into the No. 2 spot in the country, second only to California in the number of new food processing plants opened in the United States. New jobs for Holdenville, Heavener, Altus, and Ponca City . . . and the great pig deal in Guymon — 1,400 jobs in a town of 8,500 people.

I will never forget standing in Heavener at a dedication to bring 450 new jobs to that community. Representative Jim Hamilton, the Commerce Department and all of us had worked really hard on this company. Representative Mike Mass stood and pointed to the children in the band who had just played a great rendition of "Oklahoma!" and then he pointed to the beautiful hills surrounding Heavener. He said, "What this is all about is allowing those kids to enjoy that view for the rest of their lives," and then he sat down.

No amount of rural development programs and policies could ever say it better.

Having tasted success, we all cut loose — workers' comp reform, the capital access program, the manufacturers alliance, recently recognized by the White House with a \$2.7-million dollar grant to fully expand the program, were all passed. We closed two international trade offices and opened new ones in Mexico and Western Europe, redirected how all six offices did their work and up went international trade — twice the growth rate of the national average.

We organized the rural summit and then followed it with the AG 2000 working group. Another workers' comp bill passed, and it wiped out any increase in rates last year. Do you know how many states can

make that claim? Tax increases were avoided and then the Quality Jobs bill was passed.

So there I sat with Mayor Susan Savage and Clyde Cole of the Tulsa Chamber in Dallas on December 10, 1993 competing with Texas to move the operations division of Central and South West Corp. to Tulsa. Six-hundred solid, high paying, great jobs. We have done this dozens of times, but I tell you this because Dallas was tough and Ann Richards was personally involved and we blew them away.

Quality Jobs is so powerful that when combined with all the other tools you have now given us, it is impossible to ignore us and pretty difficult to beat us. Already, in just nine months, we have signed 27 deals for 7,000 jobs and many other negotiations are under way. Thank you Greg Main, Senator Ted Fisher, Representative Don McCorkell and the dozens of others who made that happen.

Not all of our economic development problems have been solved, but 13,700 new jobs last year — a seven-year record — was not peanuts. Oklahoma jumped from 45th to 25th in the nation in new job creation, and 17,000 new jobs are projected for this year. More than 1,000 new jobs are now being created every month. Oklahoma wage and salary employment for 1993 will finish at its highest level since 1982, the year the boom went bust.

Our job gain since 1987 is in the neighborhood of 110,000. Our wage and salary employment growth from 1987 to 1992 is 50 percent above the national average. Bankruptcies in 1993 were down more than 15 percent from 1992 and are at their lowest levels since 1985 or 1986. The Oklahoma General Business Index stands at levels not recorded since 1982.

A \$50-billion economy in 1988 has now passed the \$71-billion mark. I had to smile when I read a report in the Wall Street Journal that there were 43 bank failures last year — and not one, not a single one in Oklahoma. I'm here to tell you this state is back, we are back strong and we ain't playing second fiddle to anyone.

Yes, I will ask you to pass yet another workers' comp bill this year and yes, I will ask for another job-incentive package called Saving Quality Jobs. The comp bill will reduce the rates for businesses in Oklahoma — that's right, reduce the rates. Do you know how many other states are going to compete for jobs next year with a workers' compensation insurance rate reduction in their back pocket? None of them. The incentive bill will help us keep good companies in Oklahoma while we are seeking expansions and new businesses. I'm not going to be around to enjoy the full success of this one but do the next governor a favor and give them the same boost you have given me.

I have had the privilege of campaigning on five state questions in the last three years. In three of them my position won and in two my position lost. I have one more to go. Next to retaining House Bill 1017 there was not a finer moment than when the public — with your help — decided to break the 25-year drought on investing in education facilities and equipment.

We passed the \$350-million higher education bond issue, and the results are impressive. On every college campus there is either fresh dirt being turned for new construction, or needed renovations being made, or better equipment being installed. The biggest expansion of veterans' facilities in our state's history and critical improvements to our tourism infrastructure and critically needed improvements to this Capitol are finally under way.

When a review team visited Oklahoma to decide whether to give us a Robert Wood Johnson Foundation grant for our health care reform efforts — which we ultimately beat out 30 other states to get — our Oklahoma Family Choice health care proposal was analyzed. This review team, comprised of former governors and distinguished national health care leaders, called our plan, which features individual health care accounts, “the boldest plan in America.”

When a national business magazine reviewed our pay incentive plan, which has resulted in the first sustained decline in state government employment in modern history and has saved \$100 million, they called it innovative and named it “The Oklahoma Carrot.” When U.S. News and World Report ranked Oklahoma in 1992 as No. 1 among the states in improved economic activity, we all beamed.

These are points of progress and we should put partisanship aside long enough to understand how they happened and why.

We love being first. We hate being last. All of us enjoy seeing this state on the top of the lists and that’s why we have worked so hard together and have come so far together.

Now, I understand that incumbents are paid to be positive and challengers are paid to be negative, but surely just for a moment all of us can be Oklahomans and acknowledge our progress and feel a little proud of what we have done. Maybe by celebrating our progress, Republican and Democrat, urban and rural, we can summon the strength to better attack our problems instead of attacking one another.

Why is it necessary to only focus on our weaknesses and shortcomings? Of course, this state has its share of challenges — I’ve talked about them from one end of the state to the other. But I also revel in our accom-

plishments and this state’s strength, and I hope that I exude the confidence that I feel in our ability to make things happen.

It is so frustrating to hear those who say there isn’t a thing we can do except raise or cut budgets, reduce services and go home. It’s so frustrating to hear the naysayers claim that performance does not count nearly as much as the outcomes of sensationalized conflicts. That is completely inconsistent with what we know is possible, and I hope you will reject this cynicism and help us make, mold and build Oklahoma into the best state in the nation.

In this spirit, we need to attack crime and believe that we can make a difference. If you don’t believe we can make a difference, please don’t try to impede those of us who think we can. Representative Loyd Benson has a fine juvenile reform proposal. Senator Sam Helton has a children and guns bill, Senate Bill 855. Representative Gary Bastin has a good Youthful Offender Act, House Bill 2265. I have announced a plan for a dramatic expansion of prison capacity and a substantial increase in rehabilitation and training programs. The problem is clear and the solutions are many, and I won’t labor through the details but I will tell you this — all the money and all the cells and all the social workers and prison guards and bills and judicial reform in the world won’t do a lick of good if we don’t come together, in our communities and in our neighborhoods, to reject violence adamantly and convincingly.

This is a community problem. This is a cultural problem. Our citizens in their communities aren’t repulsed by violence like they once were. It frightens us, not so much its frequency as its randomness, and it makes us angry and we complain for someone to do something. But individually we are not doing enough.

It's up to you -- the citizens, the elderly, the kids, the nurses, the mothers, the engineers. Everyone has to help tackle this problem. In the past five years, the homicide rate among young men ages 15 to 24 has jumped 40 percent. That's 32 out of every 100,000. Break that out by race and it's 17 for white and 159 for African-American males. There is a domestic crime in this country every 15 seconds, and in Oklahoma a violent crime is committed every 26 minutes.

The hard reality is that we know the problem and we know where it is, and yet it is so pervasive that a democratic government cannot solve it alone. Our children today see an average of 8,000 acts of violence on television before they get out of grade school. Our kids are frequently so brutalized that they are incapable of compassion or remorse. We know where the problem is, and we know we can't lock everyone up.

As of this morning, we have 45,324 Oklahomans under the supervision of the Department of Corrections. We lead the nation in many categories, including the number of women incarcerated. Ladies and gentlemen, this is 1.5 percent of our population! Do you feel any safer now than when we used to lock up only 1 percent of our population?

You have to solve this problem. Not you as legislators, but you (pointing to the gallery) and you (pointing to the cameras). We have to make our communities mean something again. The elderly have to know the habits of the neighborhood kids. We have to rekindle a spirit of caring that moves beyond shunning violent behavior by hiding from it. If violence and drugs and gangs become the substitute in our communities for family and work and education, then there isn't a thing we can do in this chamber to save this state or this great nation.

We have to adopt our schools, we must go to our schools and volunteer and help and show to show our children that we care about them and that there is hope for them.

Jack White, our Secretary of Finance and Revenue, like many of our Cabinet officers, has volunteered during the last two years by tutoring a young man by the name of Calvin Hogg at Polk Elementary School. Before Jack showed up, this young man was introverted, had difficulty in communicating and had a difficult family situation. Jack noted an interest in art and asked Betty Price at the State Arts Council if she could help. Betty told Jack of a person in our artist-in-residence program who paid some attention to Calvin. His teachers now note a marked improvement -- he is writing and even drawing and I bet his life is going to be better.

Calvin is in the gallery today as one of my guests. I don't know what impact Jack and Betty and the artist had on this young man, but I bet they have made a difference in his life. Jack, would you and Calvin stand and be recognized?

Crime watches, neighborhood alliances, mentoring programs and school support are all excellent programs, but we don't have enough of you involved. Since moving into the Governor's Mansion from our home in the Putnam Heights neighborhood in Oklahoma City, I have really missed the Fourth of July picnics, the monthly neighborhood meetings and the evening walks where we knew our neighbors by name. I have been remiss in my new neighborhood in not getting out and learning about others in the area and offering to be of help where I can. We all can do more of this and that is what it is going to take.

The state can help, but it can't do it all. I call on all Oklahomans to volunteer to join a new project that we will call United Oklahoma Neighborhoods. Be a block captain to

help us begin to build the biggest grassroots organization in the country to finally stop crime, particularly among our children.

We have done it before. We have changed our collective view of drunk driving and we have reformed our views on smoking. When airline hijackings suddenly threatened our nation's air transportation system, it didn't take long to secure our airports. Why can't we, then, secure our neighborhoods and secure our sanctuaries of learning, our schools?

When I first walked into my daughter's school and saw metal detectors, a chill went up my spine. We were overcome with terror the afternoon that bullets from a drive-by shooting traveled the length of the school hallway just as my daughter, Tanna, was stepping out of a classroom. This has to stop. We'll spend the money, we'll build the prisons and we'll pass the laws, but ultimately the solution is up to each and every one of us.

You provided us with a Department of Volunteerism in 1992. Let's use it. Let's launch the largest volunteer community and school support project in the history of this nation, United Oklahoma Neighborhoods. I'm going to go to churches and community organizations to enlist block captains. I ask each of you, as legislators, to help organize your communities, and I ask everyone who hears or reads of this to help.

I don't know if this will work but I do know that we have to try.

I ask companies, institutions and all Oklahoma organizations to help us. Give your employees one hour a week to volunteer in organizations to help our youth. To set the example, I ask you, the Legislature, to authorize all state employees to take one hour a week from their jobs to work in youth volunteer organizations. Let us set forth this challenge, and I am confident the

private sector will follow suit. The Department of Volunteerism will provide information and guidance to those employees looking for the most worthwhile youth programs.

If we organize our communities and pass many of the plans that have been outlined prior to today, I believe that we will succeed.

I want you to meet some special people that I invited to join us here today to help show some of the people behind the words of our various proposals.

Trooper Greg Williams is 26 years old. He is married and lives in Wynnewood, where he has a house payment, a car payment and two young daughters. He holds a degree in law enforcement administration from the University of Oklahoma, and every day he get up and proudly puts on the uniform and Badge 385 of the Oklahoma Highway Patrol.

After three years of service following the most rigorous training of any Oklahoma law enforcement organization, there is still that unknown as to what he will face as he protects us. Facing danger so that we do not — every day. Trooper Williams, if you would stand so we can show you our appreciation.

He just got his W-2, and last year, for all his efforts, we paid him \$20,806.40. Almost everyone else in this building — and throughout state government, for that matter — is paid more. This is not right and we have to fix it this year. Please approve my requested pay raise for the Oklahoma Highway Patrol.

Katie Cothran is the grandmother of a 14-year-old girl who has been terrorized by a juvenile offender. Rape, knifing, break-ins have been repeated and have left this family resigned to carrying weapons and trying to prepare themselves to use them. The juve-

nile is a product of the most confused juvenile justice program in the country — ours. Please pass the Youthful Offender Act and the plan to increase secure beds. Please disarm our youth and give us the resources we need to rehabilitate this juvenile. But most of all, please help us to allow Katie Cothran and her granddaughter to find peace and to rediscover what it is like not to live in constant fear.

I would like to share one other thought about crime. I know how popular it is to pound the podium this year and say “three strikes and you’re out.” You know it must be great politics when even Governor Mario Cuomo, Thomas Grasso’s great protector, suddenly talks tough and endorses this plan. But I don’t have to prove my toughness. I have carried out the death penalty and I’ve supported law enforcement. My request to you is that we let reason and not rhetoric drive our policy decisions.

This is too important to play politics with. Everyone wants to be tough on crime — Republicans and Democrats — but how many really want to get serious about it? Attorney General Janet Reno told me a week ago in the White House that the certainty of punishment is more important than the length. I suspect that Representative Dwayne Steidley’s bill to establish truth-in-sentencing will do a lot more to seriously address this problem than all the “three-strikes” proposals put together. Please pass his bill and let’s get serious about crime and punishment.

When I took office, the clamor was great to dismantle the Department of Human Services, a \$2-billion dollar agency that employed more than 13,700 people. Last year, I said that was exactly what we were going to do, and we did. A phased plan to separate Medicaid from the department was passed last year, as well as the separation of the University Hospitals and Vocational Rehabilitation Services. These boards are ap-

pointed and operating and oversight has been increased. This year, if we pull Juvenile Services out like I and others have recommended, DHS will be less than 40 percent of the size it was when I took office. Dismantling complete.

This, however, is not enough. As the President said during his State of the Union address two weeks ago, “Even as we say no to crime, we must give our people something to say yes to.” If giving people opportunity and hope is our mission, we cannot do it through a welfare system that is broken and does a miserable job for people who really need help.

This is no small deal. In fact, the numbers are staggering and they’re growing for reasons unrelated to economic conditions. Consider this: 146,065 people involved in the families on AFDC and 372,000 people in the families receiving food stamps. Those numbers make the 6,391 folks whom we moved off of welfare into jobs last year seem almost insignificant.

Does more than 10 percent of our population really have to have food stamps? Does almost 5 percent of our population require cash payments — not counting Medicaid, energy grants, day care or other programs? As I have traveled the state, I have dropped in on numerous DHS county offices. I do two things. I ask them to show me the paperwork involved in their caseload and seek their ideas on how to reduce the bureaucratic burden. Then I ask these workers and supervisors to tell me confidentially how many people they serve really desperately need the benefits and how many have figured out how to work the system.

Do you know what they have told me? Forty percent on the average are working the system. These are not the estimates of right-wing nuts, or members of the wealthy

elite who want to dismiss the poor. These are the opinions of caring, hardworking souls who are in the trenches every day.

Increasing case loads and paperwork have created a spiral where less and less time can be spent checking and verifying eligibility, and so more and more recipients, some deservedly and some not, are added to the rolls.

Walk through one of these county offices — piles of paper that you can't see over, workers sharing phones and antiquated computers that link back to some massive mainframe computer that slows progress down more than it helps. It makes me sick to see the kind of money that we are wasting when it could be used to help those who really need help turn their lives around. It makes the public angry, and if we don't do something about it, its going to make elected officials very temporary.

It is time to put a limit on cash benefits and begin to concentrate our efforts on those programs that help people go back to work.

This means assistance with child care, health care, and education and job training before and after they get employed, not taken away if they get a job. We have some of the best ideas in the country at work here in Oklahoma, but we are having a hard time expanding the programs so that they can impact large numbers of people.

Take, for example, IndEx Inc. in Tulsa. This program, which I described last week to the President and the nation's Governors, has formed a non-profit organization that contracts with private industry to employ welfare mothers who continue to receive their benefits for six months. Their wage earnings from their work in the morning pays for their education in the afternoon.

Without spending a dime of new money, this program gives individuals both work experience and an education.

I want you to meet Joetta Williams. She was another faceless statistic, one of the thousands of Oklahomans trapped in an outdated, ineffective welfare system. For years she tried to get her GED while raising her two children, but something always happened. Nothing seemed to work.

But today Joetta is working. And it all started last February when she contacted DHS in Tulsa and was directed to IndEx Inc. For 42 weeks, she spent four hours a day wrapping fishing rods by hand, and for another four hours she took academic and skills training classes. Her children were taken care of at the local YWCA, and she was given bus tokens when she needed them. When she finished the program, she was hired full-time by Zebco.

Today, Joetta is a working, skilled, contributing member of society who feels the dignity of work and the thrill of receiving a paycheck.

Congratulations and best wishes to you, Joetta.

People tell me that we cannot limit benefits and direct the savings to child care, health care and training because we cannot guarantee a job at the end of the limit. If, after two years of support, an able-bodied person who has been offered training and education and child care and health care programs and job placement services still does not have a job, then I submit that motivation, not inability, is keeping that person out of the work force.

If we make a guaranteed job a precondition to limiting welfare benefits, then we have said, in effect, that we are not serious about changing our welfare system. This should be a social contract, an agreement of

mutual responsibility, a helping hand. If, after all of this the person, for whatever reason, does not have a job, then our support becomes the handout that holds people back. That is a disservice to the people we try to help and to the taxpayers who pay the tab.

The certainty that cash support will be cut off for able-bodied people will do more to reform welfare dependency than anything else we can do.

In addition to time limited benefits tied to expanded education and training, I have asked the Human Services Commission to concentrate on teenage pregnancy, which is driving our case load increases. I have asked the OSBI to become involved in a new task force to go after child support enforcement, and I have asked for a major initiative in work place technology to allow our social workers to meet their increasing responsibilities by easing the outrageous burden of paperwork.

Still, we have to do more and we will. Five days ago, the new federal waiver that we sought a year ago, was implemented so that we can now tie AFDC benefits to school attendance in Tulsa and Ardmore. A family cap on benefits needs to continue to be considered. Pregnant teenagers should not be allowed to move out of their parents' home to collect benefits. Paternity checks need to be made part of prenatal care, and young men need to be held responsible for their decisions.

At the same time, DHS needs to be able to cancel professional licenses issued by the state to those who don't take care of their kids, drivers licenses need to be pulled and credit card and labor records need to be opened up so we can get serious about child support enforcement. "Smart cards" should be used to provide benefits electronically. These changes and more can make our system efficient and worthwhile.

Oklahomans are compassionate people until we start spending their money on values that are inconsistent with theirs. Work and initiative and families need to be rewarded, not punished — that's all our citizens are saying. We have studied this to death. My administration alone has completed two comprehensive welfare reform studies. Now it is time to act.

As together we develop the specifics of the welfare reform package, let's be guided by the independence and the respect that Joetta Williams has achieved.

So you see, we have come a long way together but we have many more miles to go. What we have done and what we will do is meaningful and honorable — something to be proud of, and something for future generations to build on.

A young person asked me recently about the glamour and the power of politics and how do they get involved. I found myself trying so hard to give them a touch of reality, and a sense that the reason has to be better and stronger than that. You know what it takes, you know how hard it is to get here and then how hard it is to stay here. You know that if you really do your job a slow alienation sets in so that it is harder and harder to get 50 percent plus 1. The people you generally help generally forget, and the people you specifically hurt specifically remember. You ask for votes, you ask for contributions, you ask people to help make phone calls. "This isn't glamorous," I said, "this is humbling!" This is about the humility of service rather than a quest for power.

In my own case, some may think I enjoy conflict. I do not. I hope you won't confuse my tenacity with a desire for a fight. I hate being controversial, I hate seeing the things that are said about me and occasionally my family. It is true that on a particularly bad morning I have rolled my paper around with

a stick trying to decide whether to take the rubber band off. But I chose dramatic change, not tinkering around at the margins. I said I would make decisions like a one-term governor, and I have. I apologize to the bureaucrats and to the special interests because this has not been business as usual. I said change and I meant it. I offered a positive plan for the future and we achieved much of it.

Thomas Jefferson said that the true public servant builds up political capital so he can use it up doing what is right. My own interpretation of this is that the true public servants are the ones who have the courage to risk failure in order to bring success to those they serve.

Often that means risking failure that is very public and even failure that can result in public ridicule, the most painful kind. Well, I have taken the risk, I have faced the fire, and sometimes I have failed, but more often you and I and Oklahoma have succeeded.

I wish you Godspeed this year in your work as you risk failure so that all Oklahomans might see success.

WHEREAS, Raymond Dancel Gary was born to Dancel R. and Winnie Roman Gary on a farm between Madill and Kingston, Oklahoma, on January 21, 1908. Educated in local schools, he attended Southeastern State College. He married his high school sweetheart, Emma Mae Purser, on September 1, 1928; and

WHEREAS, Raymond Gary began his career of public service as a teacher at Rocky Point School. He served five years as a teacher before being elected as Marshall County Superintendent of Schools in 1932, a position he held for four years; and

WHEREAS, Raymond Gary began his business career in 1936 in the school and office supply business. He was proprietor of Gary Furniture Manufacturing Company from 1936 to 1941. In 1945 Raymond Gary formed what was to become the Sooner Oil Company and starting in 1946 served as its President. Later, he was to serve as Chairman of the Board of Madill's First National Bank and Kingston's Texoma Bank; and

WHEREAS, Raymond Gary was elected to the Oklahoma State Senate in 1941, representing Johnston and Marshall Counties in Senate District 26. During his first session he served as Chairman of the Flood Control and Drainage Committee and Vice Chairman of the Livestock and Tenant Farming Committee and Public Safety Committee. In 1943, he served as Vice Chairman of the Agriculture Committee and Chairman of the Erosion, Flood Control and Drainage Committee. The year 1945 saw Raymond Gary designated as Assistant Floor Leader and serving as Vice Chairman of the Education Committee. In 1947, Senator Gary was representing Love and Marshall Counties and serving as Chairman of the Appropriations Committee plus Vice

Chairman of the Manufacturing, Industry, Parks, Recreation, Resources and Planning Committee. He served again as Chairman of the Appropriations Committee in 1949 as well as Chairman of the Committee on Rules and Committees. He continued as Chairman of the Appropriations Committee in 1951. Senator Raymond Gary was elected President Pro Tempore of the Oklahoma State Senate for the Twenty-fourth Legislature (1953). During his 14-year tenure in the Oklahoma State Senate, he was remembered as the legislator who formulated the state's balanced budget laws and who pioneered the state's free textbook policy for public school students; and

WHEREAS, Raymond Gary was inaugurated January 10, 1955 as the State of Oklahoma's fifteenth Governor, only one of two Oklahoma Governors ever to go from the State Senate to the Governor's mansion. During his Administration, the power of the Governor's office was centralized, thanks to his experience in and close ties with the State Senate. Raymond Gary was known as a "Legislator's Governor"; and

WHEREAS, one of the first actions of Governor Gary was to order the "whites only" and "colored only" signs taken down from restrooms at the State Capitol. His administration began after the United States Supreme Court ordered that public schools be integrated. Governor Gary led the State of Oklahoma through the initial integration era and integrated public schools without any of the violence, confrontations and complications that occurred in neighboring states. He proclaimed in public that the State of Oklahoma would follow the law of the land despite opposition from many sources. Governor Gary led the movement to pass a constitutional amendment eliminating separate funding of black and white schools. His leadership was moral in nature; and

WHEREAS, Governor Gary was known as a great road builder. Under his administration, the State of Oklahoma gained 3,500 more miles of highways, 903 more bridges, saw the completion of the Skelly Drive Expressway (Interstate 44, in Tulsa, Oklahoma) and began construction of Interstate 35 north of Oklahoma City, while supporting the extension of Interstate 40 to the west of Oklahoma City. Some 800 miles of new interstate system was planned during his administration; and

WHEREAS, Governor Gary came from a rural background and was well known for his support of rural Oklahoma and its small towns. His speech and manner were from rural Oklahoma and his white cowboy hat was a familiar symbol of his administration; and

WHEREAS, Governor Gary established the Department of Commerce and Industry and supported a statewide water plan that resulted in the Oklahoma Water Resources Board. He also was a major promoter of Oklahoma's tourism industry; and

WHEREAS, after leaving the Governor's office, Raymond Gary's business grew into multimillion dollar operations including the Sooner Express, the Sooner Leasing and Rental Company and the Gary Cattle Company. He also served as a Director of the Kansas City Southern Railroad and the Louisiana and Arkansas Railroad. Gary resided on his Aberdeen Angus cattle ranch; and

WHEREAS, in 1970, Raymond Gary was inducted into the Oklahoma Hall of Fame. In 1976, he received Oklahoma State University's Henry G. Bennett Distinguished Service Award. A devout Baptist, Gary and his wife were members of the First Baptist Church in Kingston, Oklahoma, and in 1976 the Gary family donated 37 acres and \$200,000.00 for construction of the Baptist Children's Home. He served

as a trustee of Oklahoma Baptist University and was active in Rotary, Lions and the Boy Scouts of America; and

WHEREAS, Raymond Dancel Gary, the first Governor of Oklahoma born in the State of Oklahoma, at the age of 85 years old, died on Saturday, December 11, 1993, at 2:06 p.m. at Marshall Memorial Hospital in Madill, Oklahoma, of congestive heart failure after a lengthy illness.

At said meeting, the Board shall determine the limit on the growth of appropriations as provided for in this section.

EDUCATION REFORM ACT – HB 1017
Schedule 1-A

Section 41.29a of Title 62 subsection A states: "In order that the Legislature may guarantee that the increased revenue generated as a result of the tax changes contained in this act shall be appropriated to fund the education reforms provided for in this act, the Office of State Finance shall present as part of the official certification process for each fiscal year an estimate of all revenues which shall accrue to the General Revenue Fund as a result of the tax changes contained in this act. The estimate shall show the increased revenue from personal income taxes, corporate income taxes and sales and use taxes as a result of the provisions of this act separately. The estimate shall further account for changes to such revenue which result from growth or decline in said tax sources due to economic circumstances."

The method of determining the percentage of each source attributable to HB 1017 was set by the State Board of Equalization at its April 26, 1990 meeting. The ratios were established originally by dividing the estimate of revenue to be raised as a result of HB 1017 by the total estimate of revenue of each source at the time of passage of HB 1017. These ratios were updated at the February 19, 1991 meeting to reflect the annualization of what were partial year estimates at the April 26, 1990 meeting of the State Board of Equalization.

A. The governing board of any municipality is hereby authorized to enact ordinances which prohibit the sale of nonintox-

icating beverages, as defined in paragraph (a) of Section 163.2 of Title 37 of the Oklahoma Statutes, for off-premises consumption between the hours of midnight and 6 a.m. of the same day.

B. The governing board of any municipality is hereby authorized to enact ordinances which prohibit the sale of nonintoxicating beverages, as defined in paragraph (a) of Section 163.2 of Title 37 of the Oklahoma Statutes, for off-premises consumption through or at a drive-thru window.

SECTION 2. This act shall become effective September 1, 1994.

municipal subdivision thereof, becomes final, the clerk of the court wherein such judgment was rendered, shall [transmit] PROVIDE without cost a certified copy of the journal entry of such judgment to THE JUDGMENT CREDITOR OR ATTORNEY FOR THE JUDGMENT CREDITOR WHO SHALL TRANSMIT SAME TO each of the following municipal officers:

The clerk or secretary of the municipality defendant,

The treasurer of such municipality,

The secretary of the county excise board.

SECTION 3. AMENDATORY 62 O.S. 1991, Section 365.3, is amended to read as follows:

Section 365.3 Each of the three municipal officers [named in Section 2 hereof] SPECIFIED IN SECTION 365.2 OF THIS TITLE shall maintain, on forms prescribed by the State Auditor and Inspector, a record of such judgments and of levies made therefor and of payments made thereon. The record of the secretary of the county excise board shall be made to show, as to each such judgment, also the case number and date of final decree of either the Oklahoma Court of Tax Review or of the Oklahoma Supreme Court invalidating any levy or part of levy attempted to be made therefor, and it shall be his duty to notify the court clerk, forthwith, of such decree, who shall make note of the same on [his judgment roll] THE DOCKET SHEET FOR THE CASE IN WHICH THE JUDGMENT WAS ENTERED.

SECTION 4. AMENDATORY 62 O.S. 1991, Section 365.5, is amended to read as follows:

Section 365.5 Money judgments against any county or other municipal subdivisions of the State of Oklahoma shall be paid in

the following manner, and may be paid in no other manner. No payment shall be made until such judgment is first spread on the budget for levy as to the first third thereof, and the levy or provision made therefor has become final. Within thirty (30) days after the final determination of any ad valorem tax protests as involve levy for judgments against the county or any of its municipal subdivisions, or, if no protests be filed, then after termination of the forty-day protest period, the [clerk of the court out of which such judgment or judgments issued,] JUDGMENT CREDITOR OR ATTORNEY FOR THE JUDGMENT CREDITOR shall file with the treasurer of such municipality a claim, in form as prescribed by the State Auditor and Inspector, itemizing the judgments to be paid, stating the principal sum thereof, any sums paid thereon, and the balance due with interest computed on the unpaid portion of the principal amount of each judgment. THE INFORMATION REQUIRED BY THE CLAIM FORM SHALL BE SUPPLIED BY THE TREASURER OF THE MUNICIPALITY OR OF THE COUNTY, AS THE CASE MAY BE. Such treasurer shall thereupon canvass his sinking fund for the purpose of ascertaining if there be in his sinking fund for such municipality an amount of actual cash over and above the amount of cash needed to pay all coupons and bonds matured and maturing therein within the time such sinking fund will be replenished from levies made or to be made for such judgment, or judgments, he shall approve such claim in such amount as is neither in excess of such claim nor in excess of the actual cash reserve necessary for coupons and bonds as hereinbefore defined and shall transmit it to the clerk of such municipality. For all purposes of this act, the county clerk shall act for the county and all townships and dependent school districts therein. Upon receipt of such claim, the clerk shall audit the same against his own records and, if found correct he shall approve the same

and return it to such treasurer, who shall pay the amount thereof out of such sinking fund, to the clerk of the court out of which such judgments issued. Upon receipt thereof such court clerk shall issue his official receipt and deposit said funds in his official depository account, and at the same time enter a credit in each case involved in accordance with the claim previously made or in ratio thereto; and thereafter, upon demand by the judgment creditor or his assignee of record, he shall make payment by his own official voucher in the same manner as in other cases and credit the judgment roll of such judgment with the amount of payment so made. No poundage or other fee shall be charged or collected by the court clerk for monies received or paid under the provisions of this act. If such claim can be only partly paid, under this section, other claims shall be filed from time to time thereafter, audited and paid in the same manner. No payment by the court clerk shall be authorized to be made to the assignee of any judgment unless such assignment, duly acknowledged, be first entered of record in such case and on such judgment roll.", which amendment was declared adopted.

GENERAL ORDER

SB 1109 by Williams (Don) et al of the Senate and Settle et al of the House was called up for consideration.

Senator Wright and Representative Vaughn (George) asked to coauthor **SB 1109**, which was the order.

Senator Taylor presiding.

Senator Hooper moved to amend **SB 1109**, Page 8, Line 25 through Page 12, Line 2 by deleting Section 4 and inserting a new Section 4 and 5, to read as follows:

“Section 4. **NEW LAW** A new section of law to be codified in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 329.4 of Title 59, unless there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

A. 1. There is hereby constituted the Dental Board, which shall be an agency of state government.

2. The Board shall:

- a. have a seal,
- b. sue and be sued in its name, and
- c. enforce the provisions of this act.

3. The Board may:

- a. promote the dental health of the people of this state,
- b. employ independent attorneys,
- c. seek and receive the advice and assistance of the Attorney General's office of this state,
- d. engage investigators,
- e. have one or more employees,
- f. enter into contracts, and
- g. acquire, rent, hold, encumber and dispose of real and personal property as is needed.

B. 1. The Board shall consist of eight dentist members, one hygienist member, and two members who shall be selected from the public and represent the public. One dentist member of the Board shall be elected from the dentists residing in each of the six congressional districts as established by law in Section 5.1 et seq. of Title 14 of the Oklahoma Statutes, and its successors, for the election of members to the United States House of Representatives. Two dentists shall be elected at-large by all of the dentists licensed by the Board. No more than two (2) dentist members of the Board may be from the same county. One hygienist member shall be elected by all hygienists residing in this state. The two public members shall be appointed by the Governor, subject to confirmation by the Senate. No public member appointed after the effective date of this act may be a dentist, dental laboratory technician, assistant, hygienist or a denturist, or married to one of the foregoing.

2. Each member of the Board shall hold office for a period of three (3) years and until a successor in office is elected and sworn in. Individuals who have previously served on the Board, including boards under predecessor acts, shall have their public service counted in determining their eligibility to serve on the Board. No individual who has completed three terms on the Board, including terms served on the Board under predecessor acts, shall be eligible to serve further. After the effective date of this act, to be eligible to be elected and to serve on the Board, a dentist must have practiced in Oklahoma for at least five (5) years and for the five (5) years prior to his election, not have been subject to an adverse sanction by the Board.

3. The members of the Board shall be reimbursed for travel expenses as provided in the State Travel Reimbursement Act. The Board may affiliate with the American As-

sociation of Dental Examiners as an active member, pay regular dues and send Board members as delegates to its meetings.

C. The change from the districting formula of the former State Dental Act to the congressional districts specified in subsection B of this section shall be accomplished in the following manner:

1. Effective immediately, the Board member elected as a member from the former district number listed below shall serve in the following capacity:

Former District No. 1 shall serve the 6th Congressional District

Former District No. 2 shall serve the 1st Congressional District

Former District No. 3 shall serve the 4th Congressional District

Former District No. 4 shall serve the at large No. 1 position

Former District No. 5 shall serve the 5th Congressional District

Former District No. 6 shall serve the 3rd Congressional District

Former District No. 7 shall serve the 2nd Congressional District

Former District No. 8 shall serve the at large No. 2 position;

2. In the 1995 election, the Board members serving Congressional Districts 2 and 3 shall be elected by the dentists residing in their respective districts; the Board member serving the at large No. 2 position shall be elected by all the dentists;

3. In the 1996 election, the Board members serving Congressional Districts 1 and 4 shall be elected by the dentists residing in their respective districts;

4. In the 1997 election, the Board members serving Congressional Districts 5 and 6 shall be elected by the dentists residing in their respective districts; the Board member serving the at large No. 1 position shall be elected by all the dentists; and

5. The district boundaries shall be redistricted every ten (10) years in conjunction with congressional redistricting. In the event that Oklahoma shall lose a seat in Congress, five of the eight dentists serving on the Board shall represent districts and three shall serve at large. In the event that Oklahoma shall gain a seat in Congress, seven of the eight dentists serving on the Board shall represent districts and one shall serve at large.

Thereafter, the Board members shall be elected from the respective congressional districts, or at large, as described in subsection B of this section, as their terms expire.

D. 1. Nominations for dentist members of the Board from the congressional districts shall be by petition, signed by at least ten (10) dentists who are residents of the district. Nominations for the at-large members shall be by petition signed by at least twenty-five (25) dentists. Nominations for the hygienist member shall be by petition signed by at least ten (10) hygienists.

2. The elections shall be by ballot. The ballots shall be mailed by the Board to those entitled to vote at least thirty (30) days prior to the date of counting the ballots and shall be returned by mail to the secretary, and opened and counted at a meeting of the Board. In other respects, elections shall be as the Board may by rule direct.

3. Only dentists residing in the respective congressional districts shall be entitled to vote for the dental Board member from that district. At-large Board members shall

be elected by all dentists. Only hygienists residing in this state shall be entitled to vote for the hygienist Board member.

4. Dentist members of the Board may be recalled and removed from the Board in a special election called by the Board upon receipt of a written petition signed by at least twenty percent (20%) of the dentists residing in the district or, for an at-large Board member, by a recall petition signed by one hundred (100) or more dentists. The hygienist member of the Board may be recalled and removed from office by special election called by the Board upon receipt of a written petition signed by at least ten percent (10%) of the hygienists. If a majority of the votes cast are in favor of recalling the Board member, the member will be removed from the Board, effective on the date the ballots are counted.

E. If there is a vacancy among the members of the Board, then the vacancy shall be filled at the next annual election of Board members; provided however, that in the interim period, between the vacancy and the next annual election, the vacancy shall be filled as provided for in the bylaws of the Board.

Section 5. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 329.5 of Title 59, unless there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

A. 1. There is hereby created the Dental Hygienist Advisory Committee, to be composed of five (5) members to be appointed by the Dental Board. To qualify as a member, a person must be a citizen of the United States, a resident of Oklahoma for five (5) years immediately preceding appointment and a hygienist licensed to practice in this state. Members shall hold office for terms of five (5) years. Provided, of those members first appointed, two shall serve terms of two years and three shall serve terms of

five years. In the event of death, resignation or removal of any member, the vacancy of the unexpired term shall be filled by the Board in the same manner as other appointments.

2. The Dental Hygienist Advisory Committee shall assist the Board in conducting examinations for applicants and shall advise the Board on all matters pertaining to the licensure of hygienists.

3. Members of the Committee shall be reimbursed for expenses incurred while performing their duties under the provisions of this act in accordance with the State Travel Reimbursement Act.

B. 1. There is hereby created the Dental Assistant Advisory Committee, to be composed of five (5) members to be appointed by the Dental Board. To qualify as a member, a person must be a citizen of the United States, a resident of Oklahoma for five (5) years immediately preceding appointment and an assistant holding a permit to practice in this state. Members shall hold office for terms of five (5) years. Provided, of those members first appointed, two shall serve terms of two years and three shall serve terms of five years. In the event of death, resignation or removal of any member, the vacancy of the unexpired term shall be filled by the Board in the same manner as other appointments.

2. The Dental Assistant Advisory Committee shall assist the Board in conducting examinations for applicants and shall advise the Board on all matters pertaining to the certification of and issuance of permits to assistants.

C. 1. There is hereby created the Laboratory Technician Advisory Committee, to be composed of five (5) members to be appointed by the Dental Board. To qualify as a member, a person must be a citizen of the United States, a resident of Oklahoma for five (5) years immediately preceding appointment and a laboratory technician registered to practice in this state. Members shall hold office for terms of five (5) years. Provided, of those members first appointed, two shall serve terms of two years and three shall serve terms of five years. In the event of death, resignation or removal of any member, the vacancy of the unexpired term shall be filled by the Board in the same manner as other appointments.

2. The Laboratory Technician Advisory Committee shall assist the Board in setting training requirements for applicants and shall advise the Board on all matters pertaining to the registration of laboratory technicians.

3. Members of the Committee shall be reimbursed for expenses incurred while performing their duties under the provisions of this act in accordance with the State Travel Reimbursement Act.

D. 1. There is hereby created the Denturist Advisory Committee, to be composed of five (5) members to be appointed by the Dental Board. To qualify as a member, a person must be a citizen of the United States, a resident of Oklahoma for five (5) years immediately preceding appointment and a denturist holding a permit to practice in this state. Members shall hold office for terms of five (5) years. Provided, of those members first appointed, two shall serve terms of two years and three shall serve terms of five years. In the event of death, resignation or removal of any member, the vacancy of the unexpired term shall be filled by the Board in the same manner as other appointments.

2. The Denturist Advisory Committee shall assist the Board in conducting examinations for applicants and shall advise the Board on all matters pertaining to the issuance of permits to denturists.

3. Members of the Committee shall be reimbursed for expenses incurred while performing their duties under the provisions of this act in accordance with the State Travel Reimbursement Act.", and by renumbering subsequent sections, which amendment was declared adopted upon division of the question.

B. The expenditures of the Wildlife Conservation Fund shall be under the control and supervision of the Commission, and all claims against said fund shall be paid on its itemized voucher form, prepared by said Commission and sworn to by the claimant, and/or vendor's invoices as authorized under Section 86.1, Title 74 of the Oklahoma Statutes. All such claims when duly signed and sworn to shall be audited by the Commission and/or designated employees and, upon final approval, vouchers which are

payable from said fund shall be forwarded to the Director of State Finance. Upon approval thereof, warrants shall issue according to law, and said warrants shall be paid by the State Treasurer from said fund. A reserve fund of not less than One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00) shall be maintained to be used in emergencies only, by and with the consent of the Governor, and an additional reserve fund of not less than Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$200,000.00) shall be maintained for the liquidation of unissued licenses purchased by authorized agents for sale which have remained unsold when such unissued licenses are returned for refunds as provided for by law.

C. All fees, monies or funds arising from the operation and transactions of the Commission and from the application and administration of the laws and regulations pertaining to the wildlife resources of the state and from the sale of property used for said purposes shall be expended and used by said Commission for the control, management, restoration, conservation and regulation of the wildlife resources of the state, including the purchase or other acquisition of property for said purposes, and for the administration of the laws pertaining thereto and for no other purposes.", by renumbering subsequent sections and by amending the title to conform, which amendment was adopted upon roll call as follows:

employing unit's identity. Any claimant or employer or such person as he may by writing authorize as his agent shall be supplied with information from the records of the Commission, to the extent necessary for the proper presentation of his claim or complaint in any proceeding under the Employment Security Act of 1980, Section 1-101 et seq. of this title, with respect thereto.

B. Upon receipt of written request by any employer who maintains a Supplemental Unemployment Benefit (SUB) Plan, the Commission or its designated representative may release to such employer information regarding weekly benefit amounts paid its workers during a specified temporary layoff period, provided such Supplemental Unemployment Benefit (SUB) Plan requires benefit payment information before Supplemental Unemployment Benefits can be paid to such workers. Any information disclosed under this provision shall be utilized solely for the purpose outlined herein and shall be held strictly confidential by the employer.

C. The provisions of this section shall not prevent the Commission from disclosing the following information and no liability whatsoever, civil or criminal, shall attach to any member of the Commission or any employee thereof for any error or omission in the disclosure of such information:

1. The delivery to taxpayer or claimant a copy of any report or other paper filed by him pursuant to the provision of the act;

2. The disclosure of information to any person for a purpose as authorized by the taxpayer or claimant pursuant to a waiver of confidentiality. The waiver shall be in writing and shall be notarized;

3. The Oklahoma Department of Commerce may have access to data obtained pursuant to the Oklahoma Employment Security Act of 1980 pursuant to rules promulgated by the Oklahoma Employment Se-

curity Commission. The information obtained shall be held confidential by the Department and any of its agents and shall not be disclosed or be open to public inspection. The Oklahoma Department of Commerce, however, may release aggregated data, either by industry or county, provided that such aggregation meets disclosure requirements of the Oklahoma Employment Security Commission.

4. The publication of statistics so classified as to prevent the identification of a particular report and the items thereof;

5. The disclosing of information or evidence to the Attorney General or any district attorney when said information or evidence is to be used by said officials or other parties to the proceedings to prosecute or defend allegations of violations of the act. Said information disclosed to the Attorney General or any district attorney shall be kept confidential by them and not be disclosed except when presented to a court in a prosecution of a violation of the act, and a violation by the Attorney General or district attorney by otherwise releasing the information shall be a felony;

6. The furnishing, at the discretion of the Commission, of any information disclosed by said records or files to any official person or body of this state, any other state or of the United States who is concerned with the administration of assessment of any similar tax in this state, any other state or the United States;

7. The furnishing of information to other state agencies for the limited purpose of aiding in the collection of debts owed by individuals to said requesting agencies;

8. The release to officials, employees, and agents of the Oklahoma Department of Transportation of information required for

use in federally mandated regional transportation planning, which is performed as a part of their official duties;

9. The release to officials, employees and agents of the State Treasurer's office of information required to verify or evaluate the effectiveness of the Oklahoma Small Business Linked Deposit Program on job creation; [or]

10. The release to officials, employees, and agents of the Attorney General or the State Insurance Fund for use in investigation of workers' compensation fraud.; OR

11. THE RELEASE TO EMPLOYEES OF THE OKLAHOMA STATE BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION FOR USE IN CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS AND THE LOCATION OF MISSING PERSONS OR FUGITIVES FROM JUSTICE.

D. Should any of the disclosures provided for in this section require more than casual or incidental staff time, the Commission may charge the cost of such staff time to the party requesting the information.

E. It is further provided that the provisions of this section shall be strictly interpreted and shall not be construed as permitting the disclosure of any other information contained in the records and files of the Commission.", and renumbering subsequent sections and amending the title to conform, which amendment was declared adopted.

"Section 1. A. It shall be unlawful for any person [having previously been] convicted of any felony in any court of a state or of the United States to have in his possession or under his immediate control, or in any vehicle which he is operating, or in which he is riding as a passenger, any pistol, imitation or homemade [pistol] FIRE-ARM, machine gun, [sawed-off] shotgun, [or] rifle, or any other dangerous or deadly [firearm] WEAPON [which could be easily concealed on the person, in personal effects or in an automobile]; provided any person elected or appointed as a peace officer who has previously been convicted of any felony in any court of a state or of the United States, and who has received a full and complete pardon from the proper authority and has been subsequently certified by the Oklahoma Council on Law Enforcement Education and Training, pursuant to Section 3311 of Title 70 of the Oklahoma Statutes, and is actively employed as a full-time peace officer on the effective date of this act, shall be permitted to possess a weapon specified in this section for the sole purpose of performing duties of a peace officer. [For the purposes of this section, "sawed-off shotgun or rifle" shall mean any shotgun or rifle which has been shortened to any length.]

B. Any person who has previously been convicted of a nonviolent felony in any court in the State of Oklahoma, and who has received a full and complete pardon from the proper authority shall be permitted to possess a weapon specified in this section to the extent necessary for the pursuit of gunsmithing or firearm repair, provided

such person has graduated from a gunsmithing school conducted by an institution whose accreditation is recognized by the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education and who is engaged in the occupation of gunsmithing or firearm repair.”, which amendment was declared adopted.

Senator Rubottom moved to amend SB 969, Page 2, Line 12, by striking after the word “where” and before the word “resides” the word “he” and substituting the words “she (or he)” at every occurrence and by striking the word “his” and substituting the words “her (or his)” at every occurrence, which amendment was declared adopted.

Senator Weedn moved that SB 969 be advanced, which motion was declared adopted.

Except as otherwise provided, each school with a student average score in the lowest quartile of Oklahoma students and whose student average score falls below the national average score on any test administered pursuant to the Oklahoma School Testing Program Act, Section 1210.505 et seq. of this title, shall cooperate with the State Department of Education to develop a program of action to address such low achievement and shall implement such program by the beginning of the fall semester of the school year following the school year for which such low achievement is reported. For schools that test fewer than fifteen (15) pupils in any grade, the median or mean score may be used for purposes of this section.

B. **[Beginning with the 1993-94 school year, the]** THE State Board of Education shall promulgate rules to identify high challenge schools on the basis of indicators reported through the Oklahoma Educational Indicators Program. Except as otherwise provided, each school with a student average score in the lowest quartile of Oklahoma students and whose student average score falls below the national average score for three (3) consecutive years on any test of the Oklahoma School Testing Program shall be declared a high challenge school by the State Board of Education. For schools that test fewer than fifteen (15) pupils in any grade, the median or mean score may be used for purposes of this section.

C. The State Board of Education shall report to the Legislature by November 1 all districts in which at least one school has been declared a high challenge school. The annual report to the Legislature shall include test scores and other indicators for

each school declared to be a high challenge school for the prior three (3) years and shall include intervention actions that have been taken and are planned by the district board of education and the State Board of Education to ensure the proper education of the students of each such school.

D. Means of intervention which may be exercised by the State Board of Education may include but are not necessarily limited to:

1. provision of guidance and assistance to the school and school district;
2. special funding;
3. reassignment of district personnel;
4. transfer of students
5. operation of the school by personnel employed by the State Department of Education
6. mandatory annexation of all or part of the local school district; **[and]**
7. placing operation of the school with an institution of higher education as a developmental research school pursuant to the provisions of Sections [1] 1210.571 through [9] 1210.579 of this **[act]** TITLE if the high challenge school is within a single-site district and is within ten (10) miles of a college of education within an institution of The Oklahoma State System of Higher Education[.]; **AND**
8. **EXEMPTING THE SCHOOL FROM ANY RULE PROMULGATED BY THE STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION OR THE REQUIREMENTS OF SECTIONS 1-109, 1-111, 3-104.4, AND 6-101 OF THIS TITLE IF (A) THE DISTRICT IN WHICH THE SCHOOL IS LOCATED SUBMITS A PLAN INVOLVING INNO-**

VATIVE MANAGEMENT OR INSTRUCTIONAL SYSTEMS AND MATERIALS DESIGNED TO IMPROVE STUDENT PROGRESS AND ACHIEVEMENT AND (B) DEREGULATION IS NECESSARY TO ALLOW THE DISTRICT TO IMPLEMENT THE PLAN., and renumbering subsequent sections, which amendment failed upon roll call as follows:

A joint resolution directing the Secretary of State to refer to the people for their approval or rejection a proposed amendment to Article X of the Constitution of the State of Oklahoma, by adding a new Section 9F, which relates to revenue and taxation; authorizing certain maximum millage levy to maintain and operate office of county sheriff; requiring voter approval of such levy and specifying procedures therefor; specifying maximum amount of levy; providing that levy be recurring until repealed and providing procedures therefor; providing that other levies or use of other public funds for such office not prohibited; providing ballot title; and directing filing.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE AND THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE 2ND SESSION OF THE 44TH OKLAHOMA LEGISLATURE:

SECTION 1. The Secretary of State shall refer to the people for their approval

or rejection, as and in the manner provided by law, the following proposed amendment to Article X of the Constitution of the State of Oklahoma by adding a new Section 9F to read as follows:

Section 9F. For the purpose of maintaining and operating, or aiding in maintaining and operating, the office of the sheriff within any county of the state, an additional levy not to exceed ten (10) mills on the dollar of assessed valuation of the county may be levied annually, when such levy is approved by a majority of the qualified voters of the county voting on the question at an election called for such purpose by the board of county commissioners, or by initiative petition signed by not less than twenty percent (20%) of the registered voters of the county. The levy shall continue after such approval until repealed by a majority of the qualified voters of the county voting on the question at an election called for such purpose by the board of county commissioners, or by initiative petition signed by not less than twenty percent (20%) of the registered voters of the county. Nothing herein shall prohibit other levies or the use of other public funds for such office.

SECTION 2. The Ballot Title for the proposed Constitutional amendment as set forth in SECTION 1 of this resolution shall be in the following form:

THE GIST OF THE PROPOSITION IS AS FOLLOWS:

This measure would amend Article X of the Constitution by adding a new Section 9F. This measure would allow a county to levy an additional property tax of up to ten mills. The money

would be used for maintaining and operating the county sheriff's office. The levy would have to be approved by the voters of the county. An election could be called by the board of county commissioners. It could also be called by a petition signed by at least twenty percent of the voters of the county. An election to repeal the levy could be called the same way. The levy would continue until repealed. Other funds could also be used for the sheriff's office.

plaintiff and defendant shall EACH incur **[their]** HIS OR HER own attorney's fees, court costs and interest. Dear President Pro Tempore Cullison:

As you know, the Office of the Secretary of State is the official repository for all of-

ficial legislative acts. Due to the importance of the special relationship between the Secretary of State and the Oklahoma Legislature, it has been the longstanding practice of this office to return documents that are clearly incomplete or found to be in improper form.

Following a review of Enrolled Senate Joint Resolution No. 16, delivered to this office on March 10, 1994, I am returning the resolution because it is incomplete. I take this action after consultation with Attorney General Susan Loving and members of her staff.

While the resolution was presented as a complete legislative action, it is clear from its face that this resolution was forwarded without regard to the provisions of Article VI, Section 11 of the Oklahoma Constitution. This section of the Constitution requires "every bill which shall have passed the Senate and House of Representatives, and every resolution requiring the assent of both branches of the Legislature, shall before it becomes law, be presented to the Governor . . ." The section of the resolution that requires evidence of filing with the Office of the Governor is blank. Further, there is nothing to indicate from the face of the document that this legislation was affirmatively approved by the Governor within 15 days of the May 28, 1993 sine die adjournment of the Oklahoma Legislature as further required by Article VI, Section 11 of the Oklahoma Constitution.

This office will be happy to receive and officially file Senate Joint Resolution No. 16 upon receipt of a completed legislative act.

2.] May be punished in civil proceedings in district court by assessment of a civil penalty of not more than Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) for each violation;

[3] 2. May be assessed an administrative penalty pursuant to Section 26 of this

act not to exceed Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) per day of noncompliance; or

[4] 3. May be subject to injunctive relief granted by a district court. A district court may grant injunctive relief to prevent a violation of, or to compel a compliance with, any of the provisions of this Code or any rule promulgated thereunder or order, license or permit issued pursuant to this Code.

B. Nothing in this part shall preclude the Department from seeking penalties in District Court in the maximum amount allowed by law. The assessment of penalties in an administrative enforcement proceeding shall not prevent the subsequent assessment by a court of the maximum civil or criminal penalties for violations of this Code.

C. Any person assessed an administrative or civil penalty shall be required to pay, in addition to such penalty amount and interest thereon, attorneys fees and costs associated with the collection of such penalties.

D. For purposes of this section, each day or part of a day upon which such violation occurs shall constitute a separate violation.

E. The Attorney General or the district attorney of the appropriate district court of Oklahoma may bring an action in a court of competent jurisdiction for the prosecution of a violation by any person of a provision of this Code or any rule promulgated thereunder, or order, license or permit issued pursuant thereto.

F. 1. Any action for injunctive relief to redress or restrain a violation by any person of this Code or for any rule promulgated thereunder, or order, license, or permit issued pursuant thereto or recovery of any administrative or civil penalty assessed pursuant to this Code may be brought by:

- a. the district attorney of the appropriate district court of the State of Oklahoma,
- b. the Attorney General on behalf of the State of Oklahoma, or
- c. the Department on behalf of the State of Oklahoma.

2. The court shall have jurisdiction to determine said action, and to grant the necessary or appropriate relief, including but not limited to mandatory or prohibitive injunctive relief, interim equitable relief, and punitive damages.

3. It shall be the duty of the Attorney General and district attorney if requested by the Executive Director to bring such actions.

G. Except as otherwise provided by law, administrative and civil penalties shall be paid into the Department of Environmental Quality Revolving Fund.

H. In determining the amount of a civil penalty the court shall consider such factors as the nature, circumstances and gravity of the violation or violations, the economic benefit, if any, resulting to the defendant from the violation, the history of such violations, any good faith efforts to comply with the applicable requirements, the economic impact of the penalty on the defendant, the defendant's degree of culpability, and such other matters as justice may require.

I. In addition to or in lieu of any administrative enforcement proceedings available to the Department, the Department may take or request civil action or request criminal prosecution, or both, as provided by law for any violation of this Code, rules promulgated thereunder, or orders issued,

2. “Department” means the State Department of Education;

3. “Board” means the Oklahoma State Board of Education;

4. “IDEA” means the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), P.L. No. 101-476;

5. “Educational screening” means the implementation of accepted procedures for identification of children who may have special learning needs and may be eligible for special education and related services in accordance with the IDEA;

6. “Evaluation” means procedures used in accordance with federal laws and regulations to determine whether a child has a disability and the nature and extent of the special education and related services that the child needs. The term means procedures used selectively with an individual child and does not include basic tests administered to or procedures used with all children in a school, grade, or class. Provided, however, that no child shall be initially evaluated whose parent or legal guardian has not filed a written consent for such evaluation with the local board of education; and

7. “Readiness screening” means the implementation of procedures for assessing readiness for [kindergarten or] first grade as provided in Section [30] 1210.282 of this [act] TITLE.”

Section 3. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 1991, Section 1210.282, as last amended by Section 30, Chapter 116, O.S.L. 1993 (70 O.S. Supp. 1993, Section 1210.282), is amended to read as follows: A. [The State Board of Education shall develop and im-

plement a readiness screening program to screen children for readiness prior to entry into public school kindergarten. Students who have been enrolled in kindergarten without prior screening or who are expected to enroll in a public school kindergarten class shall be screened for kindergarten readiness. Results of the screening shall be made available to the child's parent or legal guardian, teacher and school district administration. A parent or legal guardian may also provide information and shall assist in making recommendations concerning a child's readiness for enrollment in kindergarten class. If a child is found to be unready for kindergarten, the report may include a recommendation that the child be enrolled in an appropriate pre-school program.

B.] The State Board of Education shall develop and implement a readiness screening program to screen students enrolled in kindergarten in the public schools of the state for readiness prior to entry into first grade in a public school. Results of the screening shall be made available to the child's parent or legal guardian, teacher and school district administration.

[C.] B. The service centers shall provide assistance and training to local schools to ensure effective procedures for readiness screening for kindergarten and first grade. Current knowledge and research information concerning screening procedures, readiness, and disabilities in early childhood shall be disseminated by the service centers.", and by renumbering subsequent sections.

1. Not more than two hundred (200) milligrams of codeine, or any of its salts, per one hundred (100) milliliters or per one hundred (100) grams.

2. Not more than one hundred (100) milligrams of dihydrocodeine, or any of its salts, per one hundred (100) milliliters or per one hundred (100) grams.

3. Not more than one hundred (100) milligrams of ethylmorphine, or any of its salts, per one hundred (100) milliliters or per one hundred (100) grams.

4. Not more than two and five-tenths (2.5) milligrams of diphenoxylate and not less than twenty-five (25) micrograms of atropine sulfate per dosage unit.

5. Not more than one hundred (100) milligrams of opium per one hundred (100) milliliters or per one hundred (100) grams.

6. NOT MORE THAN TWENTY-FIVE (25) MILLIGRAMS OF EPHEDRINE, ITS SALTS, OPTICAL ISOMERS AND SALTS OF OPTICAL ISOMERS PER TABLET OR CAPSULE.” and renumbering subsequent section and amending the title to conform, which amendment was declared adopted.

extent as will maintain or improve the existing uses and the water quality of the water affected; provided, however, the Board shall not lower or downgrade Oklahoma Water Quality Standards applicable to scenic river areas as such areas are described by Section 1452 of this title." and on Page 6, Line 2 1/2, by adding a new subsection "C" to read as follows: "C. Prior to adopting or amending any standards which would lower or downgrade any classification, criteria or other provisions authorized by subsection A of this section, the Board shall, in addition to any hearing required by subsection B of this section conduct a public hearing in a central location within the area to be affected. The Board shall cause notice of the public hearing to be published for at least three (3) consecutive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published in the county or counties in the area to be affected.", and renumber subsequent subsection, which amendment was declared adopted.

Senator Cain moved to amend HB 2227, Page 1, by striking the title.

Senator Shurden moved to table the Cain amendment, which tabling motion was declared adopted upon roll call as follows:

Employment under any conditions during this time or payment at a later time for services performed during this time period shall cause the forfeiture of all retirement benefits received during the period;

2. [Earnings from the public schools may not exceed one-half (1/2) of the member's final average salary used in computing retirement benefits, or the Earnings Limitation for employees allowed by the Social Security Administration, whichever is less] FOR RETIRED MEMBERS, THE LIMIT ON ALLOWED EARNINGS FROM PUBLIC SCHOOLS OF OKLAHOMA SHALL BE THE LESSER OF TEN THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$10,000.00) OR ONE-HALF (1/2) OF THE MEMBER'S FINAL AVERAGE SALARY USED IN COMPUTING RETIREMENT BENEFITS UNTIL THE EARNINGS LIMITATION FOR EMPLOYEES ALLOWED BY THE SOCIAL SECURITY ADMINISTRATION WOULD BE GREATER. For purposes of this paragraph, the following shall apply:

- a. earnings shall mean "regular annual compensation" as defined in subsection 25 of Section 17-101 of this title, and shall include any payment by a public school for services rendered by a retired member who is employed for any purpose whatsoever. Supplemental retirement payments paid by a former public school employer pursuant to subsection 9 of Section 17-105 of this title or other state law shall not be considered as earnings,
- b. the Earnings Limitation for employees allowed by the Social Security Administration to workers between the age of sixty-two (62) years and sixty-five (65) years shall apply to retired members below the age of sixty-two (62) years,
- c. the limit on allowed earnings from the public schools shall be automatically adjusted effective

the first day of January of each year to reflect the current Earnings Limitation for employees as determined from time to time by the Social Security Administration,

- d. earnings in excess of the maximum limit on allowed earnings from public schools of Oklahoma shall result in a loss of future retirement benefits for the year the post-retirement employment was performed of One Dollar (\$1.00) for each One Dollar (\$1.00) earned over the maximum allowed earnings amount,
- e. for those members who retired prior to July 1, 1993, the limit on allowed earnings from public schools of Oklahoma shall be the lesser of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) or one-half (1/2) of the member's final average salary used in computing retirement benefits until the Earnings Limitation for employees allowed by the Social Security Administration would be greater,]

E. [f.] for those members age seventy (70) years and over, the earnings in excess of the maximum limit allowed earnings from public schools of Oklahoma shall be one-half (1/2) the member's final average salary used in computing retirement benefits. However, any retired member receiving benefits from the Retirement System who reached age seventy (70) years prior to July 1, 1991, shall not be restricted by the earnings limits pursuant to this subparagraph until January 1, 1994. To qualify for the provisions of

this subparagraph, the member must be employed less than one-half (1/2) time compared to other full-time employees in similar positions;

B. For purposes of this section, post-retirement employment of less than one thousand (1,000) hours per year with the Governor, the State Senate, the House of Representatives or the Legislative Service Bureau shall not be considered as post-retirement employment with a public school of Oklahoma.

C. The Board of Trustees of the Teachers' Retirement System of Oklahoma shall promulgate such rules as are necessary to implement the provisions of this section.

D. A member who has entered into post-retirement employment with a participating employer of the Teachers' Retirement System of Oklahoma must fully comply with all the provisions of the rules promulgated by the Board of Trustees pursuant to this section in order to continue receiving his or her monthly retirement benefit.", and by renumbering subsequent section and by amending the title to conform, which amendment was declared adopted.

A Joint Resolution directing the Secretary of State to refer to the people for their approval or rejection proposed amendments to Sections 3 and 4 of Article XXVIII of the Constitution of the State of Oklahoma; removing requirement that wine sold at wineries be produced from grapes, fruit and berries grown in this state; clarifying that restriction on sale of nonalcoholic items and rendering of services does not apply to wineries; providing ballot title; and directing filing.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES AND THE SENATE OF THE 2ND SESSION OF THE 44TH OKLAHOMA LEGISLATURE:

SECTION 1. The Secretary of State shall refer to the people for their approval or rejection, as and in the manner provided by law, the following proposed amendments to Sections 3 and 4 of Article XXVIII of the Constitution of the State of Oklahoma to read as follows:

Section 3. The Legislature shall enact laws providing for the strict regulation, control, licensing, and taxation of the manufacture, sale, distribution, possession, and transportation of alcoholic beverages, consistent with the provisions of this Amend-

ment. Provided, that any manufacturer, or subsidiary of any manufacturer who markets his product solely through a subsidiary or subsidiaries, a distiller, rectifier, bottler, winemaker, brewer, or importer of alcoholic beverages, bottled or made in a foreign country, either within or without this state, shall be required to sell such brands or kinds of alcoholic beverages to every licensed wholesale distributor who desires to purchase the same, on the same price basis and without discrimination, and shall further be required to sell such beverages only to those distributors licensed as wholesale distributors. Winemakers either within or without this state shall be required to sell wine they produce to every licensed wholesale distributor who desires to purchase the wine, but winemakers shall not be required to sell the wine they produce only to licensed wholesale distributors. Winemakers may sell wine[,] produced at the winery [from grapes and other fruits or berries grown in this state,] to consumers on the premises of the winery. All laws passed by the Legislature under the authority of the Article shall be consistent with this provision.

Section 4. Except as hereinafter provided, retail sales of alcoholic beverages shall be limited to the original sealed package, by privately owned and operated package stores, in cities and towns having a population in excess of two hundred (200) persons or by wineries; provided that wineries shall be able to sell only wine which has been produced on the winery premises. No goods, wares, or merchandise shall be sold and no services shall be rendered on the same premises on which retail package alcoholic beverages are sold. Said premises are herein defined to be the entire space in which retail package alcoholic beverages are sold or displayed and said premises must be separated from any premises on which any other goods, wares, or merchandise are sold or services rendered by walls

which may only be broken by a passageway to which the public is not admitted; PROVIDED, THE RESTRICTION ON THE SALE OF MERCHANDISE AND RENDERING OF SERVICES SHALL NOT APPLY TO THE PREMISES OF A WINERY.

Not more than one retail package license shall be issued to any person or general or limited partnership.

Retail sale of alcoholic beverages by the individual drink for on-premises consumption is hereby authorized within a county if the voters of such county have previously approved such retail sale at an election.

SECTION 2. The Ballot Title for the proposed Constitutional amendments as set forth in SECTION 1 of this resolution shall be in the following form:

THE GIST OF THE PROPOSITION IS AS FOLLOWS:

This measure would amend the Oklahoma Constitution. It would change the Article on alcoholic beverages. The changes deal with wineries. The changes would let wineries make wine with grapes, fruit and berries grown outside this state. The changes also would make it clear that the section of the Constitution that prevents providing services and selling items other than alcoholic beverages applies only to retail package stores. As amended, the restriction would not apply to wineries.

SHALL THESE AMENDMENTS BE APPROVED BY THE PEOPLE?

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES AND THE SENATE OF THE 2ND SESSION OF THE 44TH OKLAHOMA LEGISLATURE:

SECTION 1. The Secretary of State shall refer to the people for their approval or rejection, as and in the manner provided by law, the following proposed amendment to Section 10A of Article X of the Constitution of the State of Oklahoma to read as follows:

Section 10A. To provide funds for the purpose of establishing and maintaining or aiding in establishing and maintaining public libraries and library services, a special annual recurring ad valorem tax [levy of not less than one (1) mill nor more than four (4) mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation of all taxable property in the county] shall be levied when such levy is approved by a [majority] THREE-FIFTHS

(3/5) vote of the qualified electors of the county voting on the question at an election called for that purpose by the Board of County Commissioners, either upon its own initiative or upon petition initiated by not less than ten percent (10%) of the qualified electors of the county based on the total number of votes cast at the last general election for the county office receiving the highest number of votes at such an election.

EXCEPT AS PROVIDED IN THIS SECTION, IN A COUNTY HAVING LESS THAN ONE HUNDRED FIFTY THOUSAND (150,000) POPULATION, ACCORDING TO THE MOST RECENT FEDERAL DECENNIAL CENSUS, THE SPECIAL ANNUAL RECURRING AD VALOREM TAX LEVY SHALL BE NOT LESS THAN ONE (1) MILL NOR MORE THAN FOUR (4) MILLS ON THE DOLLAR OF THE ASSESSED VALUATION OF ALL TAXABLE PROPERTY IN THE COUNTY. IN A COUNTY HAVING MORE THAN ONE HUNDRED FIFTY THOUSAND (150,000) POPULATION, ACCORDING TO THE MOST RECENT FEDERAL DECENNIAL CENSUS, THE SPECIAL ANNUAL RECURRING AD VALOREM TAX LEVY SHALL BE NOT LESS THAN ONE (1) MILL NOR MORE THAN SIX (6) MILLS ON THE DOLLAR OF THE ASSESSED VALUATION OF ALL TAXABLE PROPERTY IN THE COUNTY.

This special levy shall be in addition to all other levies and when authorized shall be made each fiscal year thereafter until such authority shall be cancelled by a majority vote of the qualified electors of the county voting on the question at an election called for that purpose by the Board of County Commissioners upon petition initiated by not less than twenty percent (20%) of the qualified electors of the county based on the total number of votes cast at the last

general election for the county office receiving the highest number of votes at such an election.

[In counties having a population of less than one hundred thousand (100,000), according to the most recent Federal Decennial Census, the] THE proceeds of such levy shall be used by the county [only] for CREATION, DEVELOPMENT, OPERATION OR MAINTENANCE OF such public libraries and library services as [are in cooperation with one or more other counties; and in counties having a population of more than one hundred thousand (100,000), according to the most recent Federal Decennial Census, the proceeds of such levy shall be used by the county for joint city-county public libraries and library services or for such public libraries and library services as are in cooperation with one or more other] counties ARE AUTHORIZED BY THE LEGISLATURE. Nothing herein shall prohibit other levies for public libraries and library services or the use of other public funds for such purposes. All expenditures of the proceeds of such levies shall be made in accordance with laws heretofore or hereafter enacted concerning such libraries and library services. The provisions hereof shall be self-executing.

SECTION 2. The Ballot Title for the proposed Constitutional amendment as set forth in SECTION 1 of this resolution shall be in the following form:

THE GIST OF THE PROPOSITION IS AS FOLLOWS:

This measure amends the State Constitution. It amends Section 10A of Article 10. This section deals with public

library systems. It also deals with taxes for libraries. This measure changes the number of votes needed to pass a tax levy for libraries. The change is from a majority of the votes to three-fifths. This measure would raise the cap on the ad valorem tax levy for libraries from four to six mills in some counties. It would raise the cap in a county with more than 150,000 people. The cap on the ad valorem tax levy for libraries in other counties with less than 150,000 people stays the same. This measure would let a county use these taxes to provide any libraries and library services that are allowed by state law.

- f. establish recreational programs, and
- g. provide health care services;

2. In establishing the facility, the Department shall minimize the institutional atmosphere and prepare the child for reintegration into the community. Provided however, the facility shall be designed and operated as a nonsecure facility used exclusively for children adjudicated delinquent whom the court has specifically found to be unmanageable, ungovernable and antisocial and no other reasonable alternative exists for treatment. The facility shall not rely on locked rooms, fences, or physical restraints. The Department shall use an already existing facility or, with proper authorization, may renovate any facility formerly used by the state or federal government.", which amendment was declared adopted.

WHEREAS, John R. McCune V, son of John R. McCune and Mary Corson McCune, was born on May 27, 1926, in Wilksburg, Pennsylvania. He received his bachelor's degree from Princeton University in 1950 and a master's degree in corrections from the University of Notre Dame. During World War II he earned two battle stars while serving as a member of the U.S. Navy Reserve. John McCune married Nancy Jane Raymond of Kansas City in 1953; and

WHEREAS, John McCune moved to Oklahoma City in 1962. He was a Rehabilitation Specialist of the Oklahoma Division of Vocational Rehabilitation. Senator McCune was elected to the Oklahoma State Senate from District 47 (northwest Oklahoma City) in 1968 and served from 1969 through 1988. He served as Minority Whip during the 33rd and 34th Legislatures (1971-1974), Assistant Minority Leader during the 35th Legislature (1975-1976) and Minority Floor Leader during the 36th Legislature (1977-1978). Senator McCune also served as Vice Chairman of the Criminal Jurisprudence Committee during the 40th Legislature (1985-1986) and Vice Chairman of the Joint Committee on Data Processing and Telecommunications during the 1st Session of the 41st Legislature (1987). He also served many years as Chairman of the Senate Engrossed and Enrolled Bills Committee. His accuracy and integrity in verifying the correct engrossment and enrollment of legislation were greatly admired and appreciated by both Senators and staff. In 1989, Governor Henry Bellmon appointed John McCune as legislative liaison for the Bellmon Administration; and

WHEREAS, Senator John McCune sponsored the prison emergency credits law, which established a system for the early release of inmates when the prison population reached capacity. He was respected by legislators of both parties as a man of integrity who voted his conscience. He also com-

plied an enviable voting record, seldom, if ever, missing a recorded vote in the Senate Chamber. In 1980, Senator McCune was elected Vice Chairman of the American Legislative Exchange Council (ALEC). ALEC, a national, nonprofit, nonpartisan, tax-exempt public affairs and research organization for state legislators was founded to support the preservation of individual liberties, basic American values, productive free enterprise and limited representative government; and

WHEREAS, John McCune, in addition to his legislative activities, demonstrated his commitment to public service by acting in a leadership role in a wide variety of civic and service organizations. He was an Elder of the Greystone Presbyterian Church. He also served as Governor of the Oklahoma District of Sertoma International (1967-1969) and on the Board of Directors of Sertoma International (1969-1972); President of the Oklahoma Rehabilitation Association; President of the Central Oklahoma Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association; Director of Speck Homes, Incorporated; and President of the Oklahoma City Metro Alliance for Safer Cities; and

WHEREAS, John McCune also served as President of the Oklahoma Halfway House; Trustee of Casady School; President of the Mental Health Association in Oklahoma County; Chairman of the Oklahoma Dispute Resolution Advisory Board; Trustee of William Woods College; Director of the Hospital Hospitality House; Director of the Neighborhood Services Organization; Christmas Seal Chairman of the Oklahoma County Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Organization; and Trustee of the Omniplex Science Museum. He was active for many years in the League for the Blind; Goodwill Industries; and Drug Recovery, Incorporated; and

WHEREAS, John McCune was a businessman, the owner of Triangle Petroleum

Corporation. He was also Chairman of the Marshall L. and Perrine D. McCune Charitable Foundation which has an endowment of \$80 million and will distribute approximately \$4 million this year. As Chairman of the Foundation, John McCune, nephew of Marshall and Perrine McCune, ensured that the foundation met its mission of making grants that enriched health, education, environment, and cultural and spiritual life; and

WHEREAS, Senator John McCune died unexpectedly Thursday, August 12, 1993, in Santa Fe, New Mexico. He is survived by his wife, Nancy; five children and their spouses; and thirteen grandchildren.

The veto message reads as follows:

This is to advise you that on this date I vetoed Enrolled **HB 1916** by Kirby et al of the House and Helton of the Senate.

HB 1916 is an unfortunate example of the kind of bad results that can occur when the normal legislative process is cut short. A 25 page floor amendment to a two page bill has produced a genuinely bad piece of legislation that did not survive the normal review undertaken in the committee process.

There is no question that the Oklahoma Department of Health has the processes in place to ensure a wholesome milk supply. It is vital that Oklahomans continue to feel that the milk they purchase at their local grocery store is continually safe for their children's consumption. While the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture does an excellent job of promoting the increased use of milk, it seems inconsistent to place the regulation of our milk supply with an entity which is completely unfamiliar with this type of regulatory responsibility.

The enactment of **HB 1916** would take the first steps to once again fragment environmental regulation. An extensive multi-year effort was culminated in July of 1993 when the new Department of Environmental Quality became a reality. **HB 1916** would move the regulation of dairy waste to the entity charged with the promotion of agriculture. This move would not only create a conflict of interest for the Department of Agriculture, it is simply not the right thing to do.

HB 1916 is obviously intended to reduce the number of agencies authorized to inspect our 800 dairies, however, the language of **HB 1916** actually increases the number of agencies authorized to inspect the thousands of Oklahoma restaurants which sell softserve ice cream. Oklahoma simply cannot afford to increase the number of inspectors within the Department of Agriculture to duplicate the restaurant inspections which are currently being done under the supervision of the Oklahoma Department of Health.

The effort made on the floor of the State Senate to add the regulation and inspection of milk and milk products into a bill which has been touted throughout the legislative session as having the sole purpose of identifying and scheduling controlled dangerous substances violates the single-subject mandate of Article V, Section 57 of the Oklahoma Constitution. The combination of these two topics clearly violates our state's prohibition against legislative logrolling.

The Supreme Court has addressed the issue of logrolling as late as the summer of 1993. When discussing the mandates found in Article V, Section 56 and 57, the court has clearly stated that, "if the bill contains multiple provisions, the provisions must reflect a common, closely akin theme or purpose. Although it is not possible to refine this formulation more precisely, it should by now be apparent from a review of our prior cases that neither Section 56 or Section 57 supports an expansive reading. The common themes or purposes embodied in legislation must be readily manifest." *Campbell v. White*, 856 P.2d 255, 260 (Okl. 1993). No relationship can be readily seen between the scheduling of dangerous drugs and a desire to move the regulation of milk and milk products to the Department of Agriculture.

While some might argue that **HB 1916** meets the "readily manifest test" as the

original language was contained in Title 63 of the Oklahoma Statutes, this argument falls on deaf ears when it is learned that Section 30 of **HB 1916** simply recodifies the bulk of the language from one title to another to accommodate the true purpose behind this bill.

For the above-stated reasons, I have vetoed **HB 1916** and directed its return to its house of origin.

Advising veto of **SB 896** on May 8, 1994.

The veto message reads as follows:

To The Honorable President Pro Tempore and Members of the Honorable Senate Second Session,
Forty-fourth Oklahoma Legislature

This is to advise you that on this date I vetoed Enrolled **SB 896** by Taylor and Haney of the Senate and Hamilton (James) and Steidley of the House.

I have vetoed **SB 896** for two simple reasons: This bill spends too much money and does not have adequate budget cuts.

Over the past several weeks, members of the Oklahoma Legislature have tried to maintain the myth that sufficient funds are not currently available for either juvenile justice reform or to handle the increase in our adult prison population. However, this legislation actually appropriates \$1.5 million more than the agencies themselves asked for in the normal process followed for budgetary review, and appropriates \$14 million more than recommended in the Executive Budget.

In my Executive Budget I presented a plan to adequately fund the basic needs of state government. As the membership of both the House and Senate are well aware, my plan proposes a trimming of our budgets in most areas by a modest 2.5% and the reallocation of excess funds to other higher priority areas. Such a plan is responsible and gives our executive branch managers the maximum flexibility needed to manage the affairs of their agencies. I cannot in good conscience sign a bill which instead appropriates funds to the various agencies, virtually across the board, at the 1993 level. Such a move would embrace the status quo — a move we cannot afford to do based upon the knowledge that we must fund reforms in our juvenile justice system and our adult corrections system.

If the status quo is allowed to stand, we will create a self-induced budget crisis which will forestall a significant anti-crime package and create artificial pressure for tax increases. We have sufficient resources in hand, through rainy day funds, new growth revenue and budget cuts, to fund the needs of state government and meet the critical need to reform juvenile justice and expand our adult prisons.

I ask each of you, before you cast your vote on a veto override, to consider this thought: A vote for this bill means that every penny spent in **SB 896** is more important than juvenile justice reform. Before we go a step further, before additional appropriation bills are considered, it is time to sit down and work out a responsible solution.

For the above reasons, I veto **SB 896**.

EXECUTIVE DECLARATION OF EMERGENCY CONDITIONS

WHEREAS, Article X, Section 23 of the Constitution of the State of Oklahoma authorizes the Governor to declare the existence of emergency conditions in the State of Oklahoma due to a lack of available monies to adequately fund certain programs vital to the state's continued development; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Article X, Section 23 of the Oklahoma Constitution, surplus funds may be released from the Constitutional Reserve Fund to provide an adequate appropriation for such programs based upon a declaration of emergency conditions issued by the Governor and the concurrence of both the House and the Senate by a two-thirds (2/3) vote; and

WHEREAS, the concurrence of both the House of Representatives and the Senate is

requested in this declaration of emergency conditions to allow funds to be allocated for the following purposes:

1. An appropriation of up to Five Million Four Hundred Fifty-one Thousand Seven Hundred Seventy-five Dollars (\$5,451,775) from the Constitutional Reserve Fund to the State Department of Education for supplements in State Aid to school districts for the 1993-1994 school year;

2. An appropriation of up to Three Million One Hundred Five Thousand Seven Hundred Nine Dollars (\$3,105,709) from the Constitutional Reserve Fund for appropriation to the Water Resources Board for the purpose of matching United States Environmental Protection Agency capitalization grants for revolving loans for wastewater system improvements;

3. An appropriation of up to Two Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000) from the Constitutional Reserve Fund for appropriation to the Department of Civil Emergency Management to provide matching funds for participation in federal disaster relief programs for those areas affected by flood in 1993 and eligible for federal matching funds due to a declaration from the President of the United States;

4. An appropriation of up to One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) from the Constitutional Reserve Fund for appropriation to the Office of the State Auditor and Inspector;

5. An appropriation of up to Twenty Million Four Hundred Fifty-seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$20,457,500) from the Constitutional Reserve Fund to the Regents for Higher Education for allocation to the various institutions;

6. An appropriation of up to One Hundred Sixty-two Thousand Thirteen Dollars

(\$162,013) from the Constitutional Reserve Fund to the Regents for Higher Education for Oklahoma Tuition Aid Grants;

7. An appropriation of up to Three Hundred Thirty-four Thousand Dollars (\$334,000) from the Constitutional Reserve Fund to the Regents for Higher Education for the Academic Scholars Trust Fund;

8. An appropriation of up to Three Million Five Hundred Seven Thousand Dollars (\$3,507,000) from the Constitutional Reserve Fund to the Regents for Higher Education for allocation to institutions that are not beneficiaries of Section Thirteen Funds and the New College Fund Trust Funds;

9. An appropriation of up to One Million Two Hundred Fifty-two Thousand Dollars (\$1,252,000) from the Constitutional Reserve Fund to the Regents for Higher Education to establish and operate the summer academies;

10. An appropriation of up to Three Million Dollars (\$3,000,000) from the Constitutional Reserve Fund to the Department of Vocational and Technical Education for capital expenditures and the duties of the State Board of Vocational and Technical Education;

11. An appropriation of up to One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) from the Constitutional Reserve Fund to the Oklahoma Tax Commission for the Ad Valorem Program;

12. An appropriation of up to Eight Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$850,000) from the Constitutional Reserve Fund to the State Election Board for the payment of costs related to special elections;

13. An appropriation of up to One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) from the Constitutional Reserve Fund to the State Emergency Fund;

14. An appropriation of up to One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) from the Constitutional Reserve Fund to the Department of Human Services for juvenile justice detention beds and delinquency and youth gang intervention;

15. An appropriation of up to One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) from the Constitutional Reserve Fund to the State Department of Education for alternative education pilot grants;

16. An appropriation of up to Six Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$600,000) from the Constitutional Reserve Fund to the Oklahoma Conservation Commission for watershed safety and maintenance;

17. An appropriation of up to Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$500,000) from the Constitutional Reserve Fund to the Oklahoma Military Department for armory maintenance and repairs; and

18. An appropriation of up to Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) from the Constitutional Reserve Fund to the Oklahoma Department of Corrections for costs related to a community work center and community sentencing.

This declaration shall be filed in the Office of the Secretary of State and distributed by the Secretary of State to the President Pro Tempore of the Oklahoma State Senate and the Speaker of the Oklahoma House of Representatives.

This is to advise you that on this date I vetoed Enrolled **HB 2668** by Hamilton (James) and Steidley of the House and Taylor and Haney of the Senate.

In 1992, I advocated and campaigned across the state for the passage of a provider tax for the Department of Human Services. I believed at that time that this type of funding mechanism would allow us to receive additional federal funds which have become critical to the delivery of services to those who qualify for medicaid funds. Regrettably, the people of the State of Oklahoma did not agree. By a wide margin, the people informed all of us that they did not want this type of funding mechanism. In light of their vote, and the fact that the provider tax which would be implemented in this legislation is exactly the type of funding mechanism proposed in 1992, I cannot break the will of the people and sign this legislation.

Forty-fourth Oklahoma Legislature

This is to advise you that on this date I vetoed Enrolled SB 911 by Taylor and Haney of the Senate and Hamilton (James) and Steidley of the House.

In 1993, the State of Oklahoma took a great step forward when we carved the University Hospitals away from the Department of Human Services and created the University Hospital Authority to run the hospitals in a more efficient, competitive manner. Regrettably, while I feel many provisions found in SB 911 correct unintended consequences from last year's legislation and allows the hospital needed flexibility, I am deeply troubled that this legislation goes too far. I cannot support the provision which exempts the Authority from the standards and limitations provided in the State Travel Reimbursement Act, nor can I support an effort to remove the power of the Governor or order a furlough or freeze on employment.

For the above reasons, I veto SB 911 and return it to its house of origin.

This is to advise you that on this date I vetoed Enrolled SB 919 by Taylor and Haney of the Senate and Hamilton (James) and Steidley of the House.

This bill creates a revolving fund within the medical examiner's office to receive fees, grants, gifts, or funds received from corporations or foundations. However, an error has been made in this legislation.

Section 1-329.1 of Title 63 refers to fees for permits for cremation, burial at sea or

other recognized means of dissolution; but, this legislation lists "death certificate fees" in reference to the statutory citation. Death certificate fees are not within the purview of the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner, but are the responsibility of the Department of Health.

2. [January 14, 1993] JANUARY 19, 1995, shall be the final date for requesting the drafting of bills and joint resolutions for introduction for consideration during the First Regular Session.

3. [January 28, 1993] FEBRUARY 2, 1995, shall be the final date for introduction of bills and joint resolutions for consideration on the floor in the house of origin during the First Regular Session. Bills and joint resolutions subsequently introduced if reported from Committee, shall not be placed on the Calendar for consideration in said house until the first legislative day of the Second Regular Session.

4. [February 18, 1993] FEBRUARY 23, 1995, shall be the final legislative day for reporting bills and joint resolutions from Committee in the house of origin, and the Committee Report must be properly filed in said house within one (1) legislative day thereafter, in order for the bill or joint resolution to be placed on the Calendar for consideration in said house during the First Regular Session. Bills and joint resolutions subsequently reported from Committee shall not be placed on the Calendar for consideration in said house until the first legislative day of the Second Regular Session.

5. [March 11, 1993] MARCH 16, 1995, shall be the final legislative day for third reading and final passage of a bill or joint resolution in the house of origin.

6. [April 1, 1993] MARCH 30, 1995, shall be the final legislative day for reporting bills and joint resolutions from Committee in the house opposite the house of origin, and the Committee Report must be properly filed in said house within one (1) legislative day thereafter, in order for the bill or joint resolution to be placed on the Calendar for consideration in said house during the First Regular Session. Bills and joint resolutions subsequently reported from Committee shall not be placed on the Calendar for consideration in said house until the first legislative day of the Second Regular Session.

7. [April 22, 1993] APRIL 20, 1995, shall be the final legislative day for third reading and final passage of a bill or joint resolution in the house opposite the house of origin.

8. [May 5, 1993] MAY 3, 1995, shall be the final legislative day for filing Conference Committee Reports. A Conference Committee Report for any bill or joint resolution returned to the Conference Committee for further consideration after [May 5, 1993] MAY 3, 1995, shall be filed no later than two (2) legislative days following the date further conference is granted. Bills and joint resolutions containing appropriation matters and which are referred to the General Conference Committee on Appropriations (GCCA) shall not be subject to the provisions of this paragraph.

9. [May 21, 1993] MAY 19, 1995, shall be the final legislative day for fourth reading and final passage of bills and joint resolutions containing appropriation matters.

10. The First Regular Session shall adjourn sine die not later than five o'clock p.m. on [May 28, 1993] MAY 26, 1995.

11. Upon a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the membership of both houses, a bill or joint resolution can be exempt from all cutoff dates in both houses.

(b) The Second Regular Session of the [44th] 45TH Oklahoma Legislature shall adhere to the following rules:

1. [January 20, 1994] JANUARY 18, 1996, shall be the final date for requesting the drafting of bills or joint resolutions for introduction for consideration during the Second Regular Session.

2. [February 3, 1994] FEBRUARY 1, 1996, shall be the final date for introduction of bills and joint resolutions for consideration on the floor in the house of origin during the Second Regular Session.

9. [May 20, 1994] MAY 24, 1996, shall be the final legislative day for fourth reading and final passage of a bill or joint resolution containing appropriation matters.

10. The Second Regular Session shall adjourn sine die not later than five o'clock p.m. on [May 27, 1994] MAY 31, 1996.

11. Upon a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the membership of both houses, a bill or joint resolution can be exempt from all cutoff dates in both houses.

(c) This Rule shall be inapplicable to any bill or joint resolution dealing with reappointment of legislative or congressional districts.

(d) This Rule shall be inapplicable to any joint resolution introduced for the purpose

of disapproving or approving agency rules pursuant to the provisions of the Administrative Procedures Act as set forth in [75 O.S. 1991,] Section 250 et seq. OF TITLE 75 OF THE OKLAHOMA STATUTES.

(e) This Rule shall be inapplicable to any bills introduced for the purposes of incorporation and merging difference versions of a statute amended in more than one measure at the same or different sessions of the Legislature as set forth in [75 O.S. 1991,] Section 23.1 OF TITLE 75 OF THE OKLAHOMA STATUTES.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES AND THE SENATE OF THE 2ND SESSION OF THE 44TH OKLAHOMA LEGISLATURE:

SECTION 1. The Secretary of State shall refer to the people for their approval or rejection, as and in the manner provided by law, the following proposed amendment to Section 10A of Article X of the Constitution of the State of Oklahoma to read as follows:

Section 10A. To provide funds for the purpose of establishing and maintaining or aiding in establishing and maintaining public libraries and library services, a special annual recurring ad valorem tax [levy of not less than one (1) mill nor more than four (4) mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation of all taxable property in the county] shall be levied when such levy is approved by a majority vote of the qualified electors of the county voting on the question at an election called for that purpose by the Board of County Commissioners, either upon its own initiative or upon petition initiated by not less than ten percent (10%) of the qualified electors of the county based on the total number of votes cast at the last general election for the county office receiving the highest number of votes at such an election.

EXCEPT AS PROVIDED IN THIS SECTION, IN A COUNTY HAVING LESS THAN ONE HUNDRED FIFTY THOUSAND (150,000) POPULATION, ACCORDING TO THE MOST RECENT FEDERAL ANNUAL CENSUS, THE SPECIAL ANNUAL RECURRING AD VALOREM TAX LEVY SHALL BE NOT LESS THAN ONE (1) MILL NOR MORE THAN FOUR (4) MILLS ON THE DOL-

LAR OF THE ASSESSED VALUATION OF ALL TAXABLE PROPERTY IN THE COUNTY. IN A COUNTY HAVING MORE THAN ONE HUNDRED FIFTY THOUSAND (150,000) POPULATION OR IN A MULTI-COUNTY LIBRARY SYSTEM WITH A COUNTY HAVING MORE THAN ONE HUNDRED FIFTY THOUSAND (150,000) POPULATION, ACCORDING TO THE MOST RECENT FEDERAL DECENNIAL CENSUS, THE SPECIAL ANNUAL RECURRING AD VALOREM TAX LEVY FOR EACH SUCH COUNTY SHALL BE NOT LESS THAN ONE (1) MILL NOR MORE THAN SIX (6) MILLS ON THE DOLLAR OF THE ASSESSED VALUATION OF ALL TAXABLE PROPERTY IN THE COUNTY.

This special levy shall be in addition to all other levies and when authorized shall be made each fiscal year thereafter until such authority shall be cancelled by a majority vote of the qualified electors of the county voting on the question at an election called for that purpose by the Board of County Commissioners upon petition initiated by not less than twenty percent (20%) of the qualified electors of the county based on the total number of votes cast at the last general election for the county office receiving the highest number of votes at such an election.

[In counties having a population of less than one hundred thousand (100,000), according to the most recent Federal Decennial Census, the] THE proceeds of such levy shall be used by the county [only] for CREATION, DEVELOPMENT, OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE OF such public libraries and library services as are [in cooperation with one or more other counties; and in counties having a population of more than one hundred thousand (100,000), according to the most recent Federal Decennial Census, the proceeds of such levy shall be used by the

county for joint city-county public libraries and library services or for such public libraries and library services as are in cooperation with one or more other counties] AUTHORIZED BY THE LEGISLATURE. Nothing herein shall prohibit other levies for public libraries and library services or the use of other public funds for such purposes. All expenditures of the proceeds of such levies shall be made in accordance with laws heretofore or hereafter enacted concerning such libraries and library services. The provisions hereof shall be self-executing.

THE GIST OF THE PROPOSITION IS AS FOLLOWS:

This measure amends the State Constitution. It amends Section 10A of Article 10. This section deals with public library systems. It also deals with taxes for libraries. This measure would raise the cap on the ad valorem tax levy for libraries from four to six mills in some counties. It would raise the cap in a county with more than 150,000 people. It would raise the cap in counties in a multi-county library system with a county having more then 150,000 people. The cap on the ad valorem tax levy for libraries in counties with less than 150,000 people stays the same. This measure would let a county use these taxes to provide any libraries and library services that are allowed by state law.

islature; modifying how certain funds may be invested; providing ballot title; and directing filing.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES AND THE SENATE OF THE 1ST SESSION OF THE 44TH OKLAHOMA LEGISLATURE:

SECTION 1. The Secretary of State shall refer to the people for their approval or rejection, as and in the manner provided by law, the following proposed amendment to Section 15 of Article X of the Constitution of the State of Oklahoma to read as follows:

Section 15. A. [The] EXCEPT AS PROVIDED BY THIS SECTION, THE credit of the State shall not be given, pledged, or loaned to any individual, company, corporation, or association, municipality, or political subdivision of the State, [except as provided for in subsection B of this section;] nor shall the State become an owner or stockholder in, nor make donation by gift, subscription to stock, by tax, or otherwise, to any company, association, or corporation[, except as provided for in subsection B of this section].

B. Pursuant to authority of and subject to requirements of law and according to professional norms established nationally in similar activities, the Oklahoma Center for the Advancement of Science and Technology or its successor may be authorized to use public funds not exceeding one percent (1%) of total state appropriations for the current fiscal year to promote economic development through grants or loans to individuals, companies, corporations or associations. Pursuant to authority of and subject to requirements of law and according to professional norms established nationally in similar activities, the Oklahoma Center for the Advancement of Science and Technology or its successor may be authorized to use public funds in order to promote economic development by purchase or owner-

ship of stock or to make other investments in private enterprises and to receive income from such investments which are involved with research or patents from projects involving Oklahoma colleges or universities. The Oklahoma Center for the Advancement of Science and Technology or its successor may only use public funds for the purposes authorized in this subsection if a statute specifically authorizing such use is approved by an affirmative vote of at least two-thirds (2/3) of the members elected to the Senate and to the House of Representatives upon final passage of such measure in each of the respective houses and with the approval of the Governor.

C. The Legislature shall only authorize use of public funds by the Oklahoma Center for the Advancement of Science and Technology or its successor as permitted by this section for promotion of economic development by creation of new employment, enhancement of existing employment or by the addition of economic value to goods, services or resources within the State authorized by subsection B herein.

D. The Legislature shall establish procedures to review and evaluate the extent to which the purposes of any statute authorizing use of public funds by the Oklahoma Center for the Advancement of Science and Technology are achieved.

E. BONDS ISSUED BY THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF ANY SCHOOL DISTRICT OR PUBLIC INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION MAY BE GUARANTEED BY THE CORPUS OF THE PERMANENT SCHOOL FUND, PROVIDED:

1. AS TO BONDS ISSUED BY THE BOARD OF EDUCATION SUCH BONDS MUST BE APPROVED BY ELECTION OF THE SCHOOL DISTRICT UPON THE QUESTION OF ISSUING SUCH BONDS;

2. AS TO BONDS ISSUED BY AN INSTITUTION WITHIN THE OKLAHOMA STATE SYSTEM OF HIGHER EDUCATION SUCH BONDS ARE ISSUED IN ACCORDANCE WITH ALL APPLICABLE PROVISIONS OF LAW; AND

3. PROVISIONS SHALL BE MADE BY THE LEGISLATURE TO GUARANTEE PROMPT REIMBURSEMENT TO THE CORPUS OF THE PERMANENT SCHOOL FUND FOR ANY PAYMENT FROM THE FUND ON BEHALF OF A SCHOOL DISTRICT OR ON BEHALF OF AN INSTITUTION WITHIN THE OKLAHOMA STATE SYSTEM OF HIGHER EDUCATION. THE REIMBURSEMENT SHALL INCLUDE A REASONABLE RATE OF INTEREST. THE PROVISIONS OF THIS PARAGRAPH REGARDING USE OF THE PERMANENT SCHOOL FUND FOR GUARANTEE OF BONDS ISSUED BY AN INSTITUTION WITHIN THE OKLAHOMA STATE SYSTEM OF HIGHER EDUCATION SHALL NOT BE SELF-EXECUTING AND THE LEGISLATURE SHALL PROVIDE BY LAW THE PROCEDURE PURSUANT TO WHICH SUCH OBLIGATIONS MAY BE GUARANTEED AND THE PROCEDURES FOR REPAYMENTS, IF ANY, REQUIRED TO BE MADE TO THE PERMANENT SCHOOL FUND.

SECTION 2. The Secretary of State shall refer to the people for their approval or rejection, as and in the manner provided by law, the following proposed amendment to Section 6 of Article 11 of the Constitution of the State of Oklahoma to read as follows:

Section 6. A. The permanent common school and other educational funds [shall] MAY be invested in first mortgages upon good and improved farm lands within the state (and in no case shall more than fifty per centum (50%) of the reasonable valuation of the lands without improvements be loaned on any tract)], Oklahoma State

bonds, county bonds of the counties of Oklahoma, school district bonds of the school districts of Oklahoma, promissory notes evidencing federal and state insured loans made to students under any federal or State of Oklahoma insured student loan program, and United States bonds, preference to be given to the securities in the order named. The said funds may also be invested in deposits in federally insured financial institutions or trust companies in Oklahoma to the extent such deposit is insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation, or the National Credit Union Administration] AND ANY OTHER INVESTMENTS AS AUTHORIZED BY LAW.

[The Legislature shall provide the manner of selecting the securities aforesaid, prescribe the rules, regulations, restrictions, and conditions upon which the funds aforesaid shall be loaned or invested, and do all things necessary for the safety of the funds and permanency of the investment.

Said funds may also be invested in loans secured by first mortgages bearing interest at the rate, to be same for all loans made during same period, of not less than three per centum (3%) per annum, given by any honorably discharged member of the armed forces of the United States, or of an ally thereof, who served in World War I, World War II, Korean War or the Viet Nam Conflict, or any future war or conflict in which the United States may become engaged, and a resident of the State of Oklahoma for not less than five (5) years, on improved or unimproved farm lands within this state. In no case shall more than ninety-three and one-half per centum (93 1/2%) of the reasonable value of the land and improvements be loaned on any tract. Any such member, before acquiring title

to such a tract of land, may apply for a loan of money to be secured by such a mortgage, said loan to be advanced and mortgage executed when and as he secures title to said tract. Said loan and mortgage securing the same shall be negotiated and executed, until otherwise provided by law, under rules and regulations prescribed by the Commissioners of the Land Office; provided, however, that the loan may not be transferred or assigned within five (5) years]

3. BY DIVERSIFYING THE INVESTMENTS OF THE TRUST FUNDS SO AS TO MINIMIZE THE RISK OF LARGE LOSSES; AND

4. IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE LAW, DOCUMENTS AND INSTRUMENTS GOVERNING THE ADMINISTRATION AND INVESTMENT OF THE PERMANENT COMMON SCHOOL AND OTHER EDUCATIONAL FUNDS AND PUBLIC BUILDING FUNDS.

THE GIST OF THE PROPOSITION IS AS FOLLOWS:

This measure amends the Oklahoma Constitution. It amends Section 15 of Article 10 and Section 6 of Article 11. The Legislature may pass laws to provide for the use of the permanent common school fund and other educational funds to guarantee certain bonds. The bonds are issued by public school districts and colleges or universities. The permanent school fund or other educational funds would be repaid any money, plus interest, paid because of the guarantees. A joint resolution directing the Secretary of State to refer to the people for their approval or rejection a proposed amendment to Section 10 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Oklahoma; authorizing the Legislature to establish minimum mandatory periods of confinement prior to parole eligibility; providing ballot title; directing filing; and ordering a special election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES AND THE SENATE OF THE 2ND SESSION OF THE 44TH OKLAHOMA LEGISLATURE:

SECTION 1. The Secretary of State shall refer to the people for their approval or rejection, as and in the manner provided by law, the following proposed amendment to Section 10 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Oklahoma to read as follows:

Section 10. There is hereby created a Pardon and Parole Board to be composed of five members; three to be appointed by the Governor; one by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court; one by the Presiding Judge of the Criminal Court of Appeals or its successor. An attorney member of the Board shall be prohibited from representing in the courts of this state persons charged with felony offenses. The appointed members shall hold their offices coterminous with that of the Governor and shall be removable for cause only in the manner provided by law for elective officers not liable to impeachment. It shall be the duty of the Board to make an impartial investigation and study

of applicants for commutations, pardons or paroles, and by a majority vote make its recommendations to the Governor of all deemed worthy of clemency. Provided, the Pardon and Parole Board shall have no authority to make recommendations regarding parole for convicts sentenced to death or sentenced to life imprisonment without parole.

The Governor shall have the power to grant, after conviction and after favorable recommendation by a majority vote of the said Board, commutations, pardons and paroles for all offenses, except cases of impeachment, upon such conditions and with such restrictions and limitations as he may deem proper, subject to such regulations as may be prescribed by law. Provided, the Governor shall not have the power to grant paroles if a convict has been sentenced to death or sentenced to life imprisonment without parole. The Legislature shall have the authority to prescribe **[for those persons convicted of three felonies arising out of separate and distinct transactions]** a minimum mandatory period of confinement which must be served BY A PERSON prior to being eligible to be considered for parole. The Governor shall have power to grant after conviction, reprieves, or leaves of absence not to exceed sixty (60) days, without the action of said Board.

He shall communicate to the Legislature, at each regular session, each case of reprieve, commutation, parole or pardon, granted, stating the name of the convict, the crime of which he was convicted, the date and place of conviction, and the date of commutation, pardon, parole and reprieve.

SECTION 2. The Ballot Title for the proposed Constitutional amendment as set forth in SECTION 1 of this resolution shall be in the following form:

THE GIST OF THE PROPOSITION IS AS FOLLOWS:

This measure would amend the State Constitution. It would amend Section 10 of Article VI. This section deals with pardon and parole. The change would let the Legislature set minimum prison terms for all convicted felons. The minimum term would have to be served before a person could be paroled. Currently, the Legislature does not have the power to set minimum prison terms except for persons convicted of three or more felonies.

SHALL THIS AMENDMENT BE APPROVED BY THE PEOPLE?

NO, AGAINST THE AMENDMENT

SECTION 3. The Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives, immediately after the passage of this resolution, shall prepare and file one copy thereof, including the Ballot Title set forth in SECTION 2 hereof, with the Secretary of State and one copy with the Attorney General.

SECTION 4. A special election is hereby ordered to be held throughout the State of Oklahoma on the date of the next statewide primary election, at which time the proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Oklahoma, as set forth in SECTION 1 of this resolution, shall be submitted to the people of Oklahoma for their approval or rejection as and in the manner provided by law.

Advising the Honorable Senate that the House of Representatives is organized and ready to convene in Joint Session.

Senator Roberts moved that the Senate meet with the House in Joint Session, and that when the clerk's desk is clear, the Senate stand adjourned to convene Tuesday, October 4, 1994, at 9:00 a.m., which motion prevailed.

Speaker Johnson presented President Pro Tempore Cullison a gavel from the members of the House of Representatives and a copy of HCR 1001 in appreciation for his leadership and his years of service in the Oklahoma Legislature.

President Mildren recognized Sergeant at Arms, Bob Craig, who announced the arrival of the Honorable David Walters, Governor of the State of Oklahoma.

Governor Walters was escorted to the Speaker's rostrum by the Joint Committee and presented to the Joint Session by President Mildren where he delivered his message.

MESSAGE OF GOVERNOR DAVID WALTERS

President Pro Tem Cullison, Speaker Johnson, Lieutenant Governor Mildren, members of the Oklahoma Legislature and citizens of Oklahoma:

Your work and my work over the past four years is paying off. Our combined efforts have spurred record job-creation activities across the state — in the big cities, in the small towns and in the rural areas. More than 75,000 additional jobs since January of 1991 — over 20,000 in the last 12 months — and the momentum is continuing to build. We've broken records . . . the fastest job growth and retail sales growth in a decade and an all-time record in the number of jobs in Oklahoma . . . and we're getting ready to break some more.

Oklahoma is on the move.

It's the political season, and that's the time when most of what you hear is how many things should be changed and how this candidate or that one is going to make things much better.

I hope they do. Together we have built a great foundation for them.

Jobs — creating jobs and retaining jobs — have been a primary focus of this administration. And not just any jobs, but high quality jobs. I am pleased at how willingly you have committed your imagination and the state's resources to creating and retaining thousands of jobs for Oklahomans.

My heartfelt thanks to you for that.

The manufacturers' alliance, the capital access program, the venture capital funds, the restructuring of our international trade efforts, our focus on food processing, Quality Jobs, Saving Quality Jobs, the first bond issue in 25 years, telecommunications and no tax increases — all of these combined have sparked a powerful engine that is moving, that is producing, that is now generating a substantial number of jobs for Oklahomans who are eager to work.

Our efforts were propelled even further when you approved two substantial workers' compensation reform packages over the past three years. After years of watching premium rates rise, Oklahoma employers last year faced no increase. Your efforts and my efforts in this area stopped the trend of rising rates dead in its tracks.

I thank you, and I know employers across the state thank you for the relief you have provided them.

I have called you here today and I come before you today to ask you to continue this important work and to allow me to finish a job that I have not yet completed.

Everywhere I go, whenever I'm recruiting a potential new employer for Oklahoma or visiting an Oklahoma company about its expansion plans, the single largest issue that arises is the cost of workers' compensation insurance in Oklahoma.

They typically know we are blessed with a large and willing work force. They know about our great vo-tech training and our state economic development programs. Many know about our dramatic improvements in education. They know of our pro-business attitudes and recognize that we're now one of the most aggressive states in the nation in attracting new business.

But the issue generally falls straight to the bottom line: How much does workers'

compensation insurance cost, and what is Oklahoma doing to contain those costs so a business can afford to operate profitably?

The reforms of the past two years have helped. But our workers' compensation insurance system is seriously flawed. It is already too expensive and yet, if no action is taken, our Oklahoma businesses face the prospect of a 100-million-dollar increase this year. And the system does not serve injured workers well.

The issue goes right to the living rooms of working men and women and their families where too many are injured unnecessarily, and their disability support is too slow and too little. Families are torn by the anxiety of suffering and the fear of financial disaster. We all have seen such injuries, sometimes painfully close to home.

Yesterday I visited my brother, Tom, who is lying in a VA hospital recovering from periodic complications from a construction accident four years ago which left him paralyzed and wheelchair-bound. Thank God he is alive, but he is a daily reminder to me and to his family of the importance of safety in the workplace and the need to better support injured workers.

So we all work hard for our own reasons for a solution that has frequently evaded us. But today I sense that an historic momentum is at play, a momentum that works to our great advantage if we will just seize the moment.

I know that my asking you to come here for this special legislative session is a burden. Many of you are anxious about campaigns or jobs or family obligations. But I also know that you are men and women who take your responsibilities seriously, and those special responsibilities sometimes require extraordinary actions. I respectfully request such an action today.

You'll recall that we came to you again with a workers' compensation reform package earlier this year, during the regular session. It didn't pass — workers' comp reform is always a tough issue. Special interest groups typically have an interest in the comfortable status quo that they helped to create. But progress is even more difficult when the actual participants in the system — business and labor — can't agree on what shape reform should take.

For the first time in Oklahoma history, we have broken the back of that antagonism.

For the first time ever in the 47-year history of the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service, business and labor leaders have sat down — in a process very similar to collective bargaining — and have worked together to forge an instrument of reform that serves the people for whom the system was designed — employers and employees.

They did it right here, in Oklahoma, in the Governor's Mansion.

I sat in on a few of their sessions. After three months, 34 meetings and over 300 hours of negotiations — that, in fact, included sessions with doctors, lawyers and representatives of the insurance industry — this group came together and said, "Here is a bill we will support."

What became known as the Oklahoma Council of Labor and Business on Workers' Compensation Reform is a group of men and women, business and labor leaders, who took time away from their families and jobs to see what they could accomplish together.

Their names are unknown to most of you, but their only desire was to change public policy to take better care of injured workers in a way that helps create more jobs in Oklahoma. Some of them are here

today, and I ask that they stand and be acknowledged for a great and successful effort.

It was among my proudest moments as Governor last Wednesday to stand in the Blue Room and hear a representative of the State Chamber of Commerce and the president of the State AFL-CIO, along with other business and labor representatives, announce their agreement.

It was a powerful moment, and not just because of the agreement. It was impressive to me in what it represented — that business and labor had finally learned that their positions need not be diametrically opposed, and that they don't have to run over each other to protect their own interests.

In the House bill to be presented to you today by Representative Don McCorkell, Senator Ben Robinson and dozens of co-authors, business negotiated a good deal for business and labor, and labor negotiated a good deal for labor and business. An "us-against-them" mentality melted into a clasp of hands. That's the forceful spirit that should carry us through our work over the next few days. If business wins and labor wins, Oklahoma works — and all of us win.

I recognize that our work is not over simply because we have a firm agreement on a strong reform bill. You know, and I know, that powerful forces with deeply entrenched special interests in the status quo, are already lobbying heavily to scuttle the chances for any success, any reform, during this special session.

Doctors, lawyers, chiropractors and others, who gain much through professional fees under the current system, understandably feel threatened by change — yet change is exactly what we need if we are to restore credibility and confidence in our workers' compensation system.

To them, I can say only this: The system exists to serve Oklahoma's injured workers and the businesses that employ them. Although you gain much from the costliness and inefficiencies of the current system, you are on the periphery. And you must remain there for the system to work.

The day we position doctors and lawyers at the center of the system is the day the system will collapse into a bureaucratic heap that serves neither injured workers or Oklahoma businesses. We had to keep the needs of employees and employers paramount during these deliberations, and that is what we have done.

If the major players in the system — business and labor — could put aside their separate agendas and come together in a very public spirited way to support meaningful reform, then we should expect no less from participants who play less central roles.

Each of you here today has had a copy of the reform team's final draft since before the weekend, and it is a very good bill.

It increases benefits, improves safety and — despite the rhetoric you may be hearing — it protects employees' right to select their family physician.

It does, however, do away with the "dueling doctors," where one doctor, hired by one side, can say a worker has no disability and another, hired by the other side, says he's totally disabled.

We estimate that out of 20,000 contested workers' comp cases in a year, we may have as many as 60,000 medical opinions being rendered, at a cost of over 30 million dollars. We have to do better than that, and this bill will allow us to do so.

The maximum payment to workers temporarily disabled will increase by 33 per-

cent, and these payments will be delivered faster — after three days rather than seven. When workers are injured, we owe it to them and their families to act quickly and provide more than a pittance for their support.

However, we must understand that the real key to making our system work efficiently is preventing some of the 100,000 Oklahoma workplace injuries in the first place. The pain and suffering that workers endure, and the costly downtime and absenteeism that employers experience, can be reduced significantly if we will simply make our workplaces safer.

I recently visited the Burlington Northern Railroad in Tulsa, which operates there one of the largest transfer stations in the nation. They realized the extraordinary cost of injuries to their company and to their employees. They set up new worker safety programs and saw their injuries in Oklahoma drop by almost two-thirds since 1992.

The Safety Health Accident Reduction Program, known as the SHARP Program, operated by the Oklahoma Department of Labor, reduced accidents at the participating companies by 75 percent.

What does that mean? It means far fewer workers and families in need of assistance. It means better service for customers. It means less costly downtime and less litigation. It means better jobs for Oklahomans and more profits for Oklahoma companies.

It has been worth the cost and effort for Burlington Northern and the SHARP Program companies, and it only stands to reason that other companies in Oklahoma can benefit, as well.

This bill mandates workplace safety committees for all companies with more than 25 employees, and it offsets that requirement

with additional safety programs offered through our vo-tech system and the Department of Labor.

The bill also provides for a sales tax rebate for purchase of safety equipment. Many have suggested that the successful workplace safety programs that Oregon implemented be duplicated here, and this bill does just that.

This bill toughens our laws on workers' compensation fraud, and it streamlines the process once a case is filed in Workers' Compensation Court. The bill dramatically expands the capacity of the Workers' Compensation Court to provide counseling and assistance to those who don't choose to hire a lawyer.

And the bottom line? This bill saves money. If this bill is passed, I will ask the State Board for Property and Casualty Rates to reduce, not increase, workers' comp rates this year. And what will that mean?

Representative Jack Bonny has a company in his district, CR Industries, which employs 300 people in the southwestern Oklahoma town of Hobart, population 4,300.

They make oil seals for Ford, GM, Chrysler and other major manufacturers in almost identical plants in Oklahoma and six other states. In the most recent report year, they paid out \$582,000 in workers' comp insurance claims at the plant in Kiowa County.

A similar plant owned by the same company in another state employs 260 workers — 40 fewer than in Oklahoma — and paid \$30,000 in claims. The workers' comp cost at all of the plants in the other six states is less than the cost at one plant in Oklahoma.

The company has talked about moving the plant out of Oklahoma.

The Hobart plant manager, Mr. Larry Shoemaker, is here with us today.

If you pass this bill, the first call I will make after signing it will be to CR Industries in Hobart and to its corporate headquarters in Elgin, Illinois, to ask them to stay.

Everyone — employers and workers — stands to gain from the major provisions of this bill. It is a responsible, credible effort, and I salute the reform team that created it and the authors who will carry it. Collectively they have and will perform an important, valuable service to the people of the State of Oklahoma.

Now it rests here, in the Legislature, before the elected representatives of the people of Oklahoma.

I encourage you to study, ponder, discuss and debate its provisions in these chambers of Oklahoma democracy. You face a unique opportunity to act decisively to create jobs in Oklahoma in a way that improves the bottom line of every company — and the security of every working family in our state.

A solid agreement has been reached. A good bill has been produced, and the time is ripe for public policy to be changed.

I ask you to use your power to take another step toward making Oklahoma the best state in the nation.
