First Regular Session of the Fiftieth Legislature of the State of Oklahoma

Thirteenth Legislative Day, Thursday, February 24, 2005

The Senate was called to order by Senator Gumm.

The prayer was offered by Reverend Terry L. Buxton, Sr., First Baptist Church North, Tulsa, the guest of Senator Eason McIntyre.

REPORT OF ENGROSSED AND ENROLLED MEASURES

SBs 407, 484 and 811 were each correctly engrossed, properly signed and ordered transmitted to the Honorable House for consideration.

FIRST READING

The following was introduced and read the first time:

SR 7 – By Lamb.

A Resolution commending the public career of former State Senator Norman Lamb; declaring February 27, 2005, “Norman Lamb Day” in the State of Oklahoma; and directing distribution.

Senator Cain asked unanimous consent to suspend Rule 5-4 and refer **SCR 8** direct to the Calendar for consideration, which was the order.

GENERAL ORDER

SCR 8 by Cain of the Senate and Blackburn of the House was called up for consideration.

SCR 8 was adopted upon motion of Senator Cain and referred for engrossment.

**UNANIMOUS CONSENT REQUEST
DIRECT TO CALENDAR**

Senator Lamb asked unanimous consent to suspend Rule 5-4 and refer **SR 7** direct to the Calendar for consideration, which was the order.

GENERAL ORDER

SR 7 by Lamb was called up for consideration.

All other members of the Senate asked to coauthor **SR 7**, which was the order.

SR 7 was adopted upon motion of Senator Lamb and referred for enrollment.

GENERAL ORDER

SB 233 by Morgan and Crutchfield of the Senate and Benge and Newport of the House was called up for consideration.

Senator Morgan moved to amend **SB 233**, by striking the title, the enacting clause and the entire body of the bill and substituting the floor substitute, which amendment was declared adopted. (Copies were provided for all Senators.)

Senator Adelson moved that **SB 233** be advanced, which motion was declared adopted.

THIRD READING

SB 233 was read for the third time at length.

HB 1234 – By Piatt of the House and Gumm of the Senate.

An Act relating to banks; amending 6 O.S. 2001, Sections 104, 201, 202, 204, as amended by Section 1, Chapter 180, O.S.L. 2003, 209, 211, as amended by Section 4, Chapter 356, O.S.L. 2003, 211.1, as amended by Section 5, Chapter 356, O.S.L. 2003, 308, as amended by Section 8, Chapter 67, O.S.L. 2002, 309, as amended by Section 9, Chapter 67, O.S.L. 2002, 310, as amended by Section 10, Chapter 67, O.S.L. 2002, 405, 414, as amended by Section 2, Chapter 180, O.S.L. 2003, 424, as amended by Section 3, Chapter 180, O.S.L. 2003, 1004, as amended by Section 16, Chapter 67, O.S.L. 2002, 1017, 1018, 1405, 1740, 1741, 2108, 2109 and 2113 (6 O.S. Supp. 2004, Sections 204, 211, 211.1, 308, 309, 310, 414, 424 and 1004), which relate to the Oklahoma Banking Code; adding entity qualified under act; providing for termination by causes defined by Board; allowing Commissioner to appoint deputy commissioners; modifying Board member requirements; modifying meeting dates of Board; allowing for payment of civil penalties; updating references to revolving fund; removing definition; increasing hourly rate; modifying what monies are in certain revolving fund; allowing for request of court reporter at hearing; eliminating capital stock minimum; requiring approval by Commissioner for exemption from effort to dispose of real estate; allowing loan proceeds to be delivered to customer; allowing for use of irrevocable letter of credit; updating language to include securities pledged or purchased; requiring mailing of notice of court order of liquidation of trust; removing application of certain provisions to bank or trust under certain conditions; providing for applicability of Oklahoma Banking Code; providing for payment of fee with exemption request; setting certification fee; allowing for revocation of exempt status under certain conditions; deleting exemption status under certain conditions; providing conditions for issuance of irrevocable letter of credit; changing type of value of security; increasing

hourly rate; allowing for certain expenses; amending 8 O.S. 2001, Section 166, which relates to cemeteries; updating reference to revolving fund; repealing 6 O.S. 2001, Section 211.2, as amended by Section 6, Chapter 356, O.S.L. 2003 (6 O.S. Supp. 2004, Section 211.2), which relates to the Oklahoma Banking Department; and providing an effective date.

HB 1245 – By Carey of the House and Gumm of the Senate.

An Act relating to public finance; amending 62 O.S. 2001, Section 7.10, as last amended by Section 52, Chapter 5, O.S.L. 2004 (62 O.S. Supp. 2004, Section 7.10), which relates to voluntary payroll deductions; modifying scope of certain payroll deductions; providing an effective date; and declaring an emergency.

HB 1265 – By Balkman of the House and Gumm of the Senate.

An Act relating to public finance; amending 62 O.S. 2001, Section 695.7, as amended by Section 1, Chapter 215, O.S.L. 2003 (62 O.S. Supp. 2004, Section 695.7), which relates to the Oklahoma State Bond Advisor; modifying provisions related to certain inducements; authorizing certain inducements; imposing restrictions; providing for negotiation related to fees for goods and services; and providing an effective date.

HB 1278 – By Peters, Hamilton, Morrisette and Cooksey of the House and Myers of the Senate.

An Act relating to residential dwellings; requiring removable bars on residential escape and rescue openings; providing for codification; and providing an effective date.

HB 1360 – By Case of the House and Monson of the Senate.

An Act relating to motor vehicles; amending 47 O.S. 2001, Sections 582, as last amended by Section 1, Chapter 229, O.S.L. 2003 and 591.5 (47 O.S. Supp. 2004, Section 582), which relate to used motor vehicle and parts dealers; modifying membership of the Used Motor Vehicle and Parts Commission; increasing amount of certain fees; and providing an effective date.

HB 1379 – By Piatt, Duncan, Nance and Hyman of the House and Crutchfield of the Senate.

An Act relating to crimes and punishments; amending 21 O.S. 2001, Section 1167, as amended by Section 1, Chapter 179, O.S.L. 2003 (21 O.S. Supp. 2004, Section 1167), which relates to injury to cemetery or tomb; modifying penalty; and providing an effective date.

HB 1405 – By Young, Askins, Blackwell, Ingmire, Winchester, Nance and Braddock of the House and Crutchfield of the Senate.

An Act relating to juveniles; amending 10 O.S. 2001, Sections 7303-4.6, as amended by Section 4, Chapter 473, O.S.L. 2002 and 7303-5.5 (10 O.S. Supp. 2004, Section 7303-4.6), which relate to juvenile adjudication proceedings; adding juvenile drug court as option; modifying definitions; providing for certain hearings; providing for certain requests and consents; providing for objections; providing for certain denials; providing for immunity from liability; prohibiting certain treatment of juveniles; providing for juvenile

drug court investigation; providing for certain evidence; providing for certain photographic records; establishing final eligibility hearing; providing for acceptance into program; defining duration of participation; providing for certain progress reports; providing for revocation; providing for certain judicial discretion; establishing costs and fees; creating the Juvenile Drug Court Revolving Fund; directing expenditures; amending 63 O.S. 2001, Section 2-503.2, as last amended by Section 3, Chapter 437, O.S.L. 2003 (63 O.S. Supp. 2004, Section 2-503.2), which relates to assessment for violation of Uniform Controlled Dangerous Substances Act; providing for collection of certain funds for drug court and juvenile drug court; providing for codification; and providing an effective date.

HB 1450 – By Duncan, Morrissette, Wesselhoft, Nance, Miller (Ray) and Walker of the House and Lamb of the Senate.

An Act relating to the Sex Offenders Registration Act; amending 57 O.S. 2001, Sections 582, as last amended by Section 34, Chapter 460, O.S.L. 2002 and 583, as last amended by Section 1, Chapter 162, O.S.L. 2004 (57 O.S. Supp. 2004, Sections 582 and 583), which relate to the Sex Offenders Registration Act; clarifying registration requirements; modifying registration requirements for persons convicted in other jurisdictions; requiring registration for certain period of time; modifying registration requirements with Department of Corrections and local law enforcement authorities; modifying certain notification requirement; and providing an effective date.

HB 1459 – By Ellis and Nance of the House and Shurden of the Senate.

An Act relating to crimes and punishments; amending 21 O.S. 2001, Section 13.1, as amended by Section 7, Chapter 22, O.S.L. 2002 (21 O.S. Supp. 2004, Section 13.1), which relates to mandatory minimum percentage of sentence to be served for certain offenses; adding assault and battery of a peace officer to mandatory minimum percentage requirement; providing an exception; and providing an effective date.

HB 1502 – By Roan and Nance of the House and Corn of the Senate.

An Act relating to public safety; amending 21 O.S. 2001, Section 1220, as last amended by Section 1, Chapter 386, O.S.L. 2004 (21 O.S. Supp. 2004, Section 1220), which relates to transporting intoxicating beverage or low-point beer; modifying penalty; amending 21 O.S. 2001, Section 1283, as amended by Section 1, Chapter 136, O.S.L. 2002 (21 O.S. Supp. 2004, Section 1283), which relates to convicted felons and delinquents; modifying certain prohibited act; amending 22 O.S. 2001, Sections 1111, 1115 and 1115.1, which relate to State and Municipal Traffic Bail Bond Procedure Act; deleting statutory reference; clarifying bail procedure; modifying statutory reference; modifying name of act; defining certain term; providing for personal recognizance bond; providing certain sanctions for failure to appear; stating provisions used under certain circumstance; providing procedures and sanctions for not responding to certain notice; requiring collection of judgment for reinstatement; declaring default under certain circumstance; providing for prima facie evidence upon filing of citation; providing an exception; stating procedures for court to follow; providing the showing of cause upon timely appearance of defendant; allowing court to set aside order under certain circumstances; requiring appearance bond under certain circumstance; amending 40 O.S. 2001, Section 552, which relates to Standards for Workplace Drug and Alcohol Testing Act; modifying certain

definition; amending 47 O.S. 2001, Section 12-417, as amended by Section 1, Chapter 35, O.S.L. 2002 and 12-422, as amended by Section 24, Chapter 397, O.S.L. 2002 (47 O.S. Supp. 2004, Sections 12-417 and 12-422), which relate to equipment of vehicles; clarifying requirements for safety seat belt system exemption; requiring placement of restriction on driver license; modifying definition; deleting certain definition; deleting certain compliance requirement; amending 47 O.S. 2001, Section 1113, as last amended by Section 4, Chapter 534, O.S.L. 2004 and 1137.1 (47 O.S. Supp. 2004, Section 1113), which relate to registration, fees, and license plates; providing exemption to registration requirement; requiring registration and display of certain license plate on certain vehicles; amending 63 O.S. 2001, Sections 4005, 4009 and 4021, as amended by Section 14, Chapter 534, O.S.L. 2004 (63 O.S. Supp. 2004, Section 4021), which relate to the Oklahoma Vessel and Motor Registration Act; providing exemption to title and registration fees; allowing issuance of yearly decals for certain vessels and motors; providing exemption to payment of certain registration fees; amending 63 O.S. 2001, Sections 4206 and 4219, which relate to the Oklahoma Boating Safety Regulation Act; requiring use of personal flotation device at certain times; modifying jurisdiction of prohibited act; repealing Section 1, Chapter 395, O.S.L. 1998, which relates to semiannual report by Department of Public Safety; repealing Section 2, Chapter 148, O.S.L. 2004 (22 O.S. Supp. 2004, Section 1108.2), which relates to personal recognizance bonds in traffic and wildlife tickets; and providing an effective date.

An Act relating to professions and occupations; amending 59 O.S. 2001, Sections 475.1, 475.2, 475.3, as amended by Section 1, Chapter 26, O.S.L. 2004, 475.4, 475.6, 475.7, 475.8, 475.9, 475.10, 475.11, 475.12, 475.13, 475.14, 475.15, 475.16, 475.17, 475.18, 475.19, 475.20, 475.21 and 475.22 (59 O.S. Supp. 2004, Section 475.3), which relate to engineering and land surveying; modifying reference from registration and its variations to licensure and its variations throughout the act; modifying certain definitions; deleting requirement that board members receive certain certificate; authorizing the board to dispose of certain complaints and order examinations as it deems necessary; deleting reference to position of secretary; adding position of Director of Enforcement; clarifying reference to certain council; modifying time period for the board to report transactions to the Governor; providing that certain rosters be made available to the public; deleting certain evidence requirement to satisfy qualifications as a professional engineer and land surveyor; adding educational requirement for certain applicants after certain date; deleting certain application requirements; modifying examination requirements; adding certain examination subject areas; providing for fees; specifying method of presenting certain documents produced by multiple licensees and a firm; providing restriction on seal and signature; adding certain words that may appear on the seal; deleting certain rule promulgation requirement of the board; deleting licensure charge; modifying certain powers of the board to suspend, revoke, or issue a license; providing procedures for allegations of certain violations; allowing for administrative penalties; deleting reference to requirements for certain final documents; modifying requirements for persons in charge of a firm; deleting reference to certain fee amount; and providing an effective date.

An Act relating to professions and occupations; amending 59 O.S. 2001, Sections 858-208, 858-601, 858-603 and 858-604, which relate to the Oklahoma Real Estate License Code; modifying powers of the Oklahoma Real Estate Commission; clarifying use of certain fund; clarifying reference to certain act as a violation; modifying reference from injury to monetary loss; increasing amount of certain maximum payment; providing for recovery of attorney fees; and providing an effective date.

HB 1609 – By Miller (Doug) of the House and Laster of the Senate.

An Act relating to motor vehicles; amending 47 O.S. 2001, Sections 581, as amended by Section 1, Chapter 483, O.S.L. 2003, 582, as last amended by Section 1, Chapter 229, O.S.L. 2003, 583, 584, and 585 (47 O.S. Supp. 2004, Sections 581 and 582), which relate to the Used Motor Vehicle and Parts Dealers; modifying certain definition; adding definition; modifying the powers and duties of the Used Motor Vehicle and Parts Commission; adding licensing requirement for Manufactured Home Salesperson; requiring certain fee; authorizing fine; adding certain violation; deleting certain violation imposed on used motor vehicle dealers; and providing an effective date.

An Act relating to state emblems; making the strawberry the official fruit of the State of Oklahoma; providing for codification; and providing an effective date.

An Act relating to crimes and criminal procedure; amending Section 3, Chapter 455, O.S.L. 2002 (21 O.S. Supp. 2004, Section 51.1a), which relates to sex crimes against children; modifying penalty to conform with other laws; amending 21 O.S. 2001, Section 645, which relates to assault with a dangerous weapon; expanding scope of crime to include certain guns, weapons and devices; amending 21 O.S. 2001, Sections 741, as amended by Section 3, Chapter 275, O.S.L. 2004 and 745 (21 O.S. Supp. 2004, Section 741), which relate to kidnapping; modifying elements of kidnapping; amending 21 O.S. 2001, Section 852, which relates to omission to provide for a child; providing venue for prosecution of violations; amending 21 O.S. 2001, Section 852.1, which relates to child endangerment; expanding scope of what constitutes child endangerment; amending 21 O.S. 2001, Section 1167, as amended by Section 1, Chapter 179, O.S.L. 2003 (21 O.S. Supp. 2004, Section 1167), which relates to destruction, mutilation, defacing, injury, or removal of cemetery structures; modifying penalty; amending 21 O.S. 2001, Sections 888 and 1115, as amended by Sections 9 and 10, Chapter 460, O.S.L. 2002 and 1123, as last amended by Section 1, Chapter 159, O.S.L. 2003 (21 O.S. Supp. 2004, Sections 888, 1115 and 1123), which relate to forcible sodomy, rape in the first degree and lewd or indecent proposals or acts against children; modifying penalties; amending 21 O.S. 2001, Section 1287, which relates to the use of a firearm while committing a felony; expanding scope of crime to include certain guns, weapons and devices; amending 21 O.S. 2001, Section 1550.2, which relates to fraudulent use of credit cards or debit cards; expanding means which are illegal; expanding scope of prohibition to include accounts; modifying penalty; amending 21 O.S. 2001, Section 1685, as amended by Section 1, Chapter 363, O.S.L. 2003 (21 O.S. Supp. 2004,

Section 1685), which relates to cruelty to animals; providing for misdemeanor and felony offenses and providing penalties therefor; specifying procedure for care of animal and assessment of charges and costs for such care; amending 22 O.S. 2001, Section 471.6, which relates to drug courts; requiring participation in active treatment and supervision periods; limiting total period of time an offender may participate in the drug court program; amending 22 O.S. 2001, Section 751, as amended by Section 5, Chapter 130, O.S.L. 2004 (22 O.S. Supp. 2004, Section 751), which relates to admission of certain reports into evidence; expanding types of reports that may be admitted; requiring that the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus test be received as evidence under certain circumstances; providing for testimony by the officer administering the test; amending 22 O.S. 2001, Section 979a, as last amended by Section 1, Chapter 455, O.S.L. 2004 (22 O.S. Supp. 2004, Section 979a), which relates to payment of jail costs by inmate; modifying distribution of amounts collected; amending 22 O.S. 2001, Section 982a, which relates to judicial modification of sentences; requiring the consent of the district attorney for certain applications for modification of sentence; amending 22 O.S. 2001, Section 1054, which relates to appeals and transcripts; requiring that transcript of trial be provided to the family of a murder victim; amending 37 O.S. 2001, Section 163.20, which relates to the sale or shipment of low-point beer; removing penalty pursuant to repealed sentencing schedule; amending 47 O.S. 2001, Section 10-104, which relates to the requirements in motor vehicle accidents resulting in injury or death; requiring driver in accident resulting in serious injury to submit to drug and alcohol testing; amending 47 O.S. 2001, Section 11-902, as last amended by Section 1, Chapter 548, O.S.L. 2004 (47 O.S. Supp. 2004, Section 11-902), which relates to persons under the influence of alcohol or other intoxicating substances, or a combination thereof who drive, operate or are in actual physical control of a motor vehicle; modifying certain penalties to pertain to persons who receive suspended sentences; modifying penalty for certain persons who transport children; modifying maximum age of child for transport violations; amending 47 O.S. 2001, Section 11-903, which relates to negligent homicide; modifying age of person who can be an offender; repealing 21 O.S. 2001, Sections 888, 1115 and 1123, as amended by Sections 4, 5 and 6, Chapter 455, O.S.L. 2002 (21 O.S. Supp. 2004, Sections 888, 1115 and 1123), which are duplicate sections which relate to certain sex crimes; providing for codification; and providing an effective date.
