HB 1074 – By Hill, Fetgatter, Bennett, Lawson, Mize, Pae, Randleman, Smith, Hasenbeck, Grego, Rosecrants and Fugate of the House and Scott of the Senate.

An Act relating to children; amending 10A O.S. 2011, Section 1-4-204, as last amended by Section 3, Chapter 342, O.S.L. 2017 (10A O.S. Supp. 2018, Section 1-4-204), which relates to determining placement for a child in custody; requiring Department of Human Services to verify applicability of certain act; providing deadline for verification; directing Department to conduct nationwide relative search for placement purposes; setting time frame for search; and providing an effective date.

HB 1110 – By West (Kevin) of the House and Kidd of the Senate.

An Act relating to crimes and punishments; amending 21 O.S. 2011, Sections 1205 and 1206, which relate to dumping trash; expanding scope of crime to include certain property; modifying penalty; amending 21 O.S. 2011, Section 1761.1, as last amended by Section 1, Chapter 119, O.S.L. 2018 (21 O.S. Supp. 2018, Section 1761.1), which relates to penalties for dumping trash; expanding scope of crime to include certain property; modifying range of penalties for traffic citation; and providing an effective date.

HB 1156 – By Worthen of the House and Leewright of the Senate.

An Act relating to public health and safety; amending 63 O.S. 2011, Sections 4002, as amended by Section 1, Chapter 323, O.S.L. 2012, and 4005 (63 O.S. Supp. 2018, Section 4002), which relate to the Oklahoma Vessel and Motor Registration Act; modifying definitions; updating statutory references; exempting canoes, kayaks and paddleboats from title and registration requirements; providing an exception; allowing owners of exempt vessels to title and register vessels for certain purposes; requiring payment of title and registration fees; and providing an effective date.

HB 1175 – By Perryman of the House and Coleman of the Senate.

An Act relating to public health and safety; amending 63 O.S. 2011, Section 1-321, which relates to the amendment of certificate or record; providing for amendment of death certificate; and providing an effective date.

HB 1207 – By Conley of the House and McCortney of the Senate.

An Act relating to public safety; amending 70 O.S. 2011, Section 3311, as last amended by Section 1, Chapter 217, O.S.L. 2017 (70 O.S. Supp. 2018, Section 3311), which relates to the Council on Law Enforcement Education and Training; modifying certain salary and training repayment requirements; and providing an effective date.

HB 1220 – By Hardin (Tommy) of the House and Simpson of the Senate.

An Act relating to conveyances; amending 16 O.S. 2011, Section 79, which relates to penalties for filing slanderous notice of claim; requiring courts to award certain costs and fees; and providing an effective date.

HB 1273 – By Lawson of the House and Stanley of the Senate.

An Act relating to children; amending 10A O.S. 2011, Sections 1-4-501 and 1-4-909, which relate to the Oklahoma Children's Code; authorizing counsel for Department of Human Services to represent interests of state in certain proceedings; providing for consent of district attorney; modifying when child may request court to reinstate terminated parental rights; lowering age requirement of child; providing retroactive applicability for certain sibling groups; granting retroactive applicability for child of a failed permanency plan; and providing an effective date.

HB 1279 – By Lawson and Munson of the House and Stanley of the Senate.

An Act relating to mental health; amending 43A O.S. 2011, Sections 5-502, as amended by Section 1, Chapter 280, O.S.L. 2016, 5-503 and 5-511 (43A O.S. Supp. 2018, Section 5-502), which relate to definitions; modifying definition; providing for voluntary and involuntary admission for treatment; expanding requirements for admission to hospital or inpatient mental health or substance abuse treatment; requiring hearings pursuant to the Inpatient Mental Health and Substance Abuse Treatment of Minors Act; modifying rights to type of hearing; and providing an effective date.

HB 1280 – By Lawson of the House and Haste of the Senate.

An Act relating to Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services; amending 43A O.S. 2011, Sections 1-103, as last amended by Section 1, Chapter 246, O.S.L. 2017 and 3-461 (43A O.S. Supp. 2018, Section 1-103), which relate to the Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services Law; modifying definitions; adding qualification for assisted outpatient treatment; modifying licensure requirements for ADSAC assessors; and providing an effective date.

HB 1290 – By Miller of the House and Bice of the Senate.

An Act relating to state government; amending 74 O.S. 2011, Section 3003, as amended by Section 2, Chapter 289, O.S.L. 2012 (74 O.S. Supp. 2018, Section 3003), which relates to the State Use Committee; modifying definition; and providing an effective date.

HB 1360 – By Hasenbeck, Boles and Lawson of the House and Kidd of the Senate.

[teachers - Education Leadership Oklahoma Act - modifying purpose of the Education Leadership Oklahoma program - modifying expenditures from the Education Leadership Oklahoma Revolving Fund - effective date]

HB 1404 – By Humphrey of the House and Bullard of the Senate.

An Act relating to local government funding options; authorizing county to call for an election regarding the tax of rock, gravel, granite, sand and limestone upon severance; providing exception for materials extracted on private property by natural persons; providing exception for limestone extracted for agricultural purposes; requiring voter approval before levying of tax; specifying time period before subsequent special election can be called under certain circumstances; providing effective date for tax levy or change in tax rate; requiring designation of purpose for tax and specifying purposes; specifying disposition of funds; providing for duration of tax; requiring Oklahoma Tax Commission to provide certain notice; modifying effective date of rate change under specified circumstances; authorizing certain contract between county and Tax Commission and providing contract criteria; authorizing Tax Commission to charge specified fee; requiring initiative petitions be in compliance with specified statutes; mandating specified procedures; setting time period during which election shall be held; providing for certain credit based on sales tax treatment; providing for apportionment of revenues to municipalities under certain circumstances; prohibiting counties from imposing certain fees, charges, assessments or related costs; providing for codification; and providing an effective date.

HB 1425 – By Loring of the House and Montgomery of the Senate.

An Act relating to fees; amending 14A O.S. 2011, Section 2-417, as last amended by Section 2, Chapter 31, O.S.L. 2017 (14A O.S. Supp. 2018, Section 2-417), which relates to surcharges for use of credit or debit cards; providing for certain fees for online transactions; amending 28 O.S. 2011, Section 151, which relates to the collection of fees, fines, costs and assessments; exempting certain courts from certain collection requirements; and providing an effective date.

HB 1641 – By Echols of the House and Bice of the Senate.

An Act relating to alcoholic beverages; amending Section 13, Chapter 366, O.S.L. 2016, as last amended by Section 2, Chapter 312, O.S.L. 2018 (37A O.S. Supp. 2018, Section 2-101), which relates to fees; modifying name of certain license; adding certain license information; amending Section 19, Chapter 366, O.S.L. 2016, as amended by Section 11, Chapter 364, O.S.L. 2017 (37A O.S. Supp. 2018, Section 2-107), which relates to the wine and spirits wholesaler license; authorizing wine or spirits wholesaler licensee to purchase or import from certain additional sources; restricting certain purchases of alcoholic beverages by wholesalers; requiring certain licensees to collect and remit excise

taxes on certain imports; expanding exception to the certain restrictions on the sales of spirits and wine between wholesalers; amending Section 47, Chapter 366, O.S.L. 2016 (37A O.S. Supp. 2018, Section 2-135), which relates to the manufacturer's license; authorizing the election of designating or nondesignating manufacturer status; and providing an effective date.

HB 1642 – By Echols of the House and Bice of the Senate.

An Act relating to alcoholic beverages; amending Section 19, Chapter 366, O.S.L. 2016, as amended by Section 11, Chapter 364, O.S.L. 2017 (37A O.S. Supp. 2018, Section 2-107), which relates to the wine and spirits wholesaler license; clarifying from whom wine or spirits wholesaler licensees may purchase or import; requiring certain licensees to collect and remit excise taxes on certain imports; expanding exception to certain restrictions on the sales of spirits and wine between wholesalers; amending Section 69, Chapter 366, O.S.L. 2016, as amended by Section 2, Chapter 113, O.S.L. 2018 (37A O.S. Supp. 2018, Section 2-157), which relates to winery self-distribution; modifying the manner in which taxes are paid; amending Section 104, Chapter 366, O.S.L. 2016, as amended by Section 13, Chapter 205, O.S.L. 2017 (37A O.S. Supp. 2018, Section 5-101), which relates to excise tax on alcoholic beverages; modifying the manner in which excise tax is paid and by whom; amending Section 127, Chapter 366, O.S.L. 2016 (37A O.S. Supp. 2018, Section 5-124), which relates to a certain required bond; modifying the applicability of a certain bond requirement; specifying who is affected by bond requirement; and providing an effective date.

HB 1643 – By Echols of the House and Bice of the Senate.

An Act relating to alcoholic beverages; amending Section 93, Chapter 366, O.S.L. 2016 (37A O.S. Supp. 2018, Section 3-123), which relates to the sale of alcoholic beverages to wholesalers or retailers; modifying prohibition against certain sales of alcoholic beverages to wholesalers; excepting certain inducements from prohibition; prohibiting price discrimination in sales of alcoholic beverages to retailers, with certain exception; prohibiting inducements, with certain exception; authorizing wine and spirits wholesalers to refuse to make certain deliveries; clarifying situations in which the posting or invoicing of charges is permitted; expanding effect of certain exception within title and administrative rules; authorizing the imposition of a tiered structure of fines or license suspension or revocation; specifying fine amounts; and providing an effective date.

HB 1852 – By Fetgatter of the House and Bice of the Senate.

An Act relating to revenue and taxation; amending 68 O.S. 2011, Section 1004, as last amended by Section 8, Chapter 8, 2nd Extraordinary Session, O.S.L. 2018 (68 O.S. Supp. 2018, Section 2368), which relate to the Oklahoma Income Tax Code; providing exceptions based upon elections made pursuant to the Pass-Through Entity Tax Equity Act of 2019; providing for codification; and declaring an emergency.
